### FROM THE PASTOR The Pastor's Pastor

Six years ago, Michael and I visited Wittenberg, the city of the Reformation, while in Germany to reconnect with my family. I loved being in that historic place and could have lingered especially in the two famous local churches as well as Luther's home. I took tons of pictures and touched as many items as possible (even forbidden ones, yikes!). But, I knew I had to make sure there was enough time to go through the Bugenhagen House as Michael had spent many years researching the life, ministry and theology of Johannes Bugenhagen who, among many accomplishments and blessings, had the honor (or was it the scary task?) to serve as Martin Luther's pastor and confessor when he was the resident clergy person of St. Mary's, the City Church of Wittenberg.

North Iowans of German descent ought to take particular note of Pastor Bugenhagen for you (we!) share a common background; he was from Pomerania and perhaps had more widespread influence on the lives of our ancestors than anyone else. His heritage got him the nickname "Pomeranus"- or "Dr. Pomeranus" as Luther preferred.

Bugenhagen was born in Wollin, Pomerania in 1485 and matriculated at the University of



Greifswald to study classics and eventually became Rector of the Latin school in Treptow. He was ordained a priest in 1509. In 1520, he read one of Luther's writings and decided that Luther was a heretic. So, he read the document again, changed his mind, contacted Luther and started a vigorous correspondence with him. Three years later, when the Pope excommunicated Luther, Bugenhagen left Treptow for Wittenberg, studied theology and became Pastor of the Wittenberg City Church where he served until his death. He was the first of all reformers to marry and eventually officiated at the wedding of Martin and



**The Bugenhagen House in Wittenberg, Germany**. For 500 years, until the end of the 20th century, Bugenhagen House served as a parsonage and meeting place for the Protestant town church congregation, and at the same time as the seat of the Superintendency. Continuing its traditional functions and use, today the building still serves as a community and meeting center for the Protestant town church congregation and their guests. It is used for conferences, training courses and religious or cultural events.

Katie Luther – and rigorously publicly defended Luther's decision to wed baptized their children. Years later, Bugenhagen presided at Luther's funeral, preaching with tears streaming down his face. He extolled God for the

extraordinary gifts He had showered on the Church through Luther and prayed for the preservation of the work that had just begun. He seemed to have little idea of how much his own work was an answer to that prayer of preserving the Reformation.

History sees Bugenhagen's lasting contribution in the way he applied Luther's theology as an administrator in northern Germany and Scandinavia. He developed so-called 'Kirchenordnungen' (church orders) and tried to balance the theological directives of the Reformation with the practices of pastors and congregations. Such often took him out of Wittenberg and Luther complained more than once that he had to fill in for Bugenhagen! Both, Luther and Bugenhagen, preach at the same church and in a sense shared the preaching office, even though Luther served as professor and teacher at the time. Bugenhagen was known for having particularly long sermons, many lasting up to three hours. I am still wondering how these two preachers worked their schedule for it is well known that Luther himself preached up to 70 times per year.... obviously, folks went to church more often than today  $\bigcirc$ 

Some of the practical questions Bugenhagen sought to address in his efforts to let the faith be lived out in the community, for example, sounded like this: who should receive Holy Communion when and how; when should the Sacrament be denied and how would it be prepared. Bugenhagen translated Luther's Bible into Low German to make it even more accessible and created a harmony of the Passion Narrative for the devotional life of simple folks (that Narrative is used to this very day and yours truly has used it, albeit in English). While he fervently agreed with preaching in the vernacular he loved the singing of Latin songs and encouraged the youth to study them.

Bugenhagen also emphasized the importance of the church in society. Education was important to him as it was for his mentor, Luther. Likewise, he preached the care for the poor and sick and proper interaction with government officials.

After Luther's death Bugenhagen became rather marginalized. He died in 1558 and is buried under the altar at the Wittenberg City Church where he had served so long and faithfully.

It is a good reminder that Martin Luther whom we surely perceive as the 'go-to-person' in all things theology, saw and knew the importance of having a pastor in whom he could confide; who would either encourage and support or admonish and re-direct him. Luther evidently saw value in being able 'to let his hair down' and felt safe doing so. Bugenhagen's pastoral love and care for Luther and his family serves as a glorious example that pastors are not lone rangers but redeemed sinners with problems, needs, desires, hopes and disappointments ...and require a listening ear and a shoulder to cry on. Martin and Johannes already lived it 500 years ago.

## STEWARDSHIP MUSINGS

Following Christmas a few years ago there was a cartoon in the *New Yorker* magazine that pictured a well-to-do businessman leaning back at his desk with his hands resting on his head and a broad smile on his face. The caption read, "During the holiday season, Mr. Arthur Jefferson takes a little time out of each day to think of those who are less fortunate."

Are we like this? Do we look at the enormity of the problem and ask ourselves, "What could I possibly do about world poverty (or any other overwhelm-

ing problem we are facing right now)?" We convince ourselves that even winning the lottery and giving it away would hardly be a drop in the bucket compared to the magnitude of the problem. Sure, that is not entirely untrue – but it also is not entirely correct. Can you or I single-handedly solve these huge issues we are facing? No. But we can do "something." Each one of us has to do what we can with what we have. Whether it is supporting a mission fund, or volunteering at a soup kitchen, or assisting with any of dozens of other programs, including those within our own church community, we can help alleviate the problem in some way, great or small. The trick is to 'get going'. Standing in front of a challenge and deciding that we will not be able to overcome it, paralyzes our thoughts and actions. It is not any different than staring at 10 loads of laundry or a garden full of weeds: you don't start and eventually you will not have any clean clothes to wear and the weeds will choke out the bean plants. Therefore, we start up the washing machine and get out the garden hoe.

It is not any different with our time or funds toward the large concerns of humanity. Get started. Do something. Don't just sit there making excuses. And yes, just like there are other household chores besides doing laundry and weeding the garden, so there are plenty of 'issues' right in front of our noses. And some of them will be very important and necessary and need our attention and effort. But: just like we do not stop taking out the garbage or cook supper because we need to do the laundry and weed the garden, so there is no reason – really!! – not to respond to calls for help that draw us outside our four walls. We indeed

cannot do it all and nobody, including God I venture to say, expects us to do it all. But we can do something.... our share.



There you can find photos, get updates and information on church events. Any post on our page or comment on photos and videos must be approved by a page administrator. This will help in assuring that we are presenting our church in the best way. We will never post, mention or "tag" names on our Facebook page. We will not use photo or video of anyone without their consent and parents will be asked to fill out a 'Permission for Use of Images' form at the start of the Sunday school year.
- That Merlin and Lisa Bartz and Pastor Z will attend the 2017 NALC Convocation in Nashville? Please hold in prayer all those who travel and commend their decision-making process to God so it may be pleasing to Him. Pastor will leave early on Tuesday, August 8<sup>th</sup> so she can attend the preceding Theological Conference for clergy and return on Saturday, August 12<sup>th</sup> in the afternoon. Since all active NALC clergy persons in the area will be in Nashville, Pastor has secured Pastor Paul Weeg to tend to immediate needs in emergencies.
- That our wooden front door will get a face-lift? After several years of concern and lots of research we have decided to have the door refurbished this Fall. All panels are cracked and allow heat to escape and cold air to enter and we recognize that we are not energy-efficient any longer. The work will be done by Ron Wunderlich Woodworking from Mason City. The cost will be graciously covered by a Memorial.

• That we will observe the 500<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of



the Reformation with our brothers and sisters from

several Lutheran congregations in our immediate vicinity? The day to remember is Sunday, October 29<sup>th</sup> at 3:00 pm right here at Emmanuel. While some of the details are still a bit 'sketchy', we know our time will be filled with lots of wonderful music and we will enjoy a sit-down dinner that will be 'as German as we can manage'. Please keep your ears perked because we soon will look for participating musicians of various stripes and maybe two or three persons to help with the dinner. The efforts toward this day are communal: each participating congregation with work toward the success of the event. The shared efforts will make for light work and plenty of enjoyment.

- That we have received two invitations from neighboring Lutheran congregations to join them on trips to the Ark Encounter and the Creation Museum? One trip will take place from June 5-8, 2018 with a cost of \$655 per person (double occupancy) and the other trip will be from July 9-13, 2018 with a price of \$605 for the same arrangement. If you wish to know more information, please see Pastor Z who will gladly give you the contact information.... we certainly would want individuals be able to join but we will not officially organize participation as a congregation. We would need King Solomon to help us decide with whom to go!
- That the abduction of two Roman Catholic priests in Congo is raising concern over the number of hostages held by local militias in the troubled country? Earlier this month the priests were abducted from the Parish of Notre Dame in the Butembo-Beni Diocese. They have not been seen since. Armed raiders entered the parish, looted a vehicle and motorbike and beat up seminarians before fleeing with the two priests, according to news reports. "The kidnappers are demanding ransom for their release," said Bishop Marcel Utembi. "At the moment, everything seems to lead us to believe that these two priests are alive. Contacts have been made

with the public authorities, the ecclesiastical authorities and the group of kidnappers, whose precise identity is not well-defined." In addition, more than 1,000 people are currently in the hands of the kidnappers, according to the bishop. While Cameroon, Nigeria and Mali have also seen priest abductions, Congo appears to be taking a lead. The Catholic Church is the largest religious group in Congo, and about 50 percent of its residents are members. (Twenty percent are Protestant and 10 percent Muslim.)

• That three-quarters of the nation's Muslims say they sense a lot of discrimination against their faith group and half say being Muslim in this country has been more difficult in recent years, a new Pew Research Center survey shows? But even more Muslims- 89 percent, say they are proud to be both American and Muslim. A significant majority also profess a continuing faith in the American dream. In the last decade, an increasing percentage of Muslims say they have experienced support from others because they are Muslim — 49 percent in the most recent survey, up from 37 percent in 2011 and 32 percent in 2007. But even as Muslims have a growing sense of American support, they report increasing instances of religious discrimination in the past year — from being treated with suspicion to physical attacks. Almost half — 48 percent — say that was their experience, compared to 43 percent in 2011 and 40 percent in 2007. The study also pointed to some clear divides in gender. "Muslim women are more likely than men to say that Muslims face a variety of challenges," said Farid Senzai, a

political science professor at Santa Clara University and a survey adviser. "This idea of being both American and being Muslim obviously is now the clear consensus view of Muslims," said Bagby, another adviser on the study. "And to me it's actually quite remarkable that we've come that far." Here are a dozen other findings about U.S. Muslim adults: 85 percent say believing in God is essential to what it means to be Muslim; 82 percent are concerned about extremism in the name of Islam around the world; 80 percent fast during Ramadan; 76 percent say targeting or killing civilians is never justified; 65 percent say religion is very important in their lives; 65 percent don't think there is a natural conflict between Islam and democracy; 64 percent say there is more than one true way to interpret Islam; 53 percent of Muslims are married; 52 percent say homosexuality should be accepted by society; 44 percent are employed full time; 43 percent attend mosque weekly.


