FROM THE PASTOR

The Tart Result of Sweet Temptations



In early July Michael and I spent several hours picking our delicious red currants. The currant bush which we planted behind the parsonage has grown well and the promise of bright, tart jelly never escapes us. Therefore, we went through building a cage to protect the bush from the rabbits and threw not one but two bird nets over the blessing.

My currants however not only create yummy jelly but remind me of my very personal and real sinfulness. Here we go: I am a currant thief! The first thing I remember taking without permission ("stealing" for short!) was a cluster of red, ripe currants which were hanging over the fence of a small garden alongside the walkway that led from our apartment house to a bus stop. Thinking about it

even now I can taste the fruit on my tongue – and the guilt in my heart. Granted, most adults nowadays would grin seeing a little girl delight in a fruit which otherwise was not accessible to her. What's the harm losing a few berries when your bush is producing an overabundance – share freely! But for me this sticks in my mind and is forever a reminder of human temptation which leads to sin.

Lutherans are often accused of paying too much attention to sin. Indeed, we all would like to avoid sin-talk unless, of course, we are discussing the sins of others or societal ills. We often sugarcoat our sins. We do have a stake at hiding the truth of sin. And hiding one sin usually leads to committing other sins. In the end we often simply decide that we are at least not as bad as the guy whose mug shot glares at us from the Globe Gazette.

Lutherans however also have somewhat of a sense that confession is good for the soul. Even with a pre-printed confession in our hymnal and the familiar voice of the local clergy declaring "in the name of the triune God I forgive you all your sins", we acknowledge at a minimum that we fail God's hope for our lives, that we place ourselves more often than not in the place that only God ought to

occupy and that we are utterly helpless getting ourselves out of our messes. It's a start.

"Wretched man that I am. Who will rescue me from this body of death"? asked the Apostle Paul after he had admitted that "I do not do what I want, but I do the very thing I hate."

I read a quote from a book by Micha Boyett which I would like to share with you: Sin is not something I could just stop. It was not simply wrongdoing. It was deeper. It was brokenness. It was in me more than it was coming out of me. My spirit was tilted, imbalanced. I was off kilter deep in the unknown places, and that was what needed fixing. And, even more, this was the case for the whole world. We are all askew, all looking for something to right us, to set us toward True North.

What Ms. Boyett writes resonates with me. Perhaps we all need to cry out: I am broken! Fix me! I

want the life that is abundant which Jesus promises us. Neglecting to speak about our

sinfulness and refusing to point to the deep brokenness in us does not make the pain go away and it does not repair relationships. We need to talk about this pain that in so many ways makes our lives miserable and binds us to actions and feelings that are destructive.

If we can talk about sin in the sense of being off kilter no matter what we try to find balance, we also can talk about grace – that incredible gift from God in His devotion to a wonderful creation that has gone awry.

Dietrich Bonhoeffer, pastor theologian and resistance fighter of WWII, has given us the famous phrase of "cheap grace" which refuses to see the great cost God has taken upon Himself to save us in Jesus. Cheap grace refuses to look at our brokenness, our missing the mark, our separation from God, others and ourselves (see my guilt about

stealing currants!). This has little to do with judging others or ourselves. Of course, we can look and talk about sin in many ways, appropriately and incorrectly, but we may not dismiss it altogether. At the very least we must acknowledge that Jesus loves sinners (forgiven sinners that we are) and yet we remember simultaneously the words "go and sin no more".

Our recognition that something is askew in our lives is the first step to setting it right. We need to admit that we need help. If we do not think that anything is broken, well, why would we need someone to fix it? Jesus is only needed if we can admit that without him we are lost and the chasm between us and God will not be healed.

Transformation can only come when we know we are tangled up in such a way that we need to have actions and words from the outside to untangle us

for good. We are broken, off kilter, not in balance, without Jesus.

Moreover, we must pay attention

to the serious danger that we will end up in sorrow and despair if we think there is no way out of our sin, our despair, our darkness. There is! We belong to a Lord who was born to die so we may die to sin and live forever. He died "as a sacrifice to sin and a model of the godly life" as we say in one of our post-Communion prayer.

Sin does have a hold on us but it cannot win the day unless we refuse blatantly to see the remedy: Jesus Christ. Before we see the sin in others, may we see it in ourselves. Before we fall prey to

despair, may we call upon the Lord and help others do the same. I only wish stealing red currants would be all I needed to confess. PZ+

Dear members and friends of Emmanuel Lutheran,

Your Church Council has kept a very close and watchful eye on the financial standing of our congregation over the last few months. We have noted with concern that our balance has remained negative by several thousand dollars for quite some time now. While the information can be found in our newsletters, we want to make sure that you are kept abreast of developments...therefore this announcement.

Our offerings have not been as limited as one would think based on the negative variance and we have been faithful in making sure that many of our building needs have been taken care of. Thank you for all the special offerings you may have contributed to those matters! As far as our Current Fund is concerned, we have encountered a number of expenses we could not realistically foresee when we set the budget. From our LP bills to administrative concerns, we have had to face some unexpected bills and even the infusion of a limited amount from our Savings account has not yet brought the hoped-for result.

On the other hand, wages are at or under projection and in several cases we have been under-budget in our Committee work. Still, the fact of our expenses not meeting our resources remains troublesome. We are therefore in the midst of brain-storming how we can increase revenue both in the short-term and for long-range planning. Please keep your eyes open for some suggestions we might present to you in the near future.

Your feedback is always welcome and we encourage all of us to prayerfully consider how we as individuals and households can help elevate this time of fiscal strain. Thank you for all you do. Please be assured that we endeavor to be as faithful as possible with your shared gifts.



Reclaiming Life

I was only about ten years old but I remember it just as if it happened yesterday: the telegram from East Germany that brought the news of my mother's cousin, Uncle Fritz, who had taken his own life. Uncle Fritz was the brother my mother and her sisters never had. On the day of his death he had kissed his wife 'good-bye', promised to be home on time for dinner and agreed to drive her into the center of Berlin to run errands. Jovial and intelligent he had avoided to get caught up in the brutal politics of East Germany and against all odds rose to manage a huge government owned farm with dozens of workers. Thinking of Uncle Fritz nobody would speak of 'depression and anxiety'; careful research after his death showed no indication of illness, financial difficulties or moral failings. Fiftysome years later, his death remains as confounding a mystery as it was on the day it happened.

Kate Spade, Anthony Bourdain, a young actor here, an aspiring model there – we have been inundated with news flashes of suicides over the last few months. It seems to be getting worse rather than better – or perhaps we are paying simply more attention because the notifications have reached a critical mass.

The Center for Disease Control and Prevention recently published a study that shows that the suicide rates in the areas of farming, fishing and forestry is five times higher than in the population as a whole. Never mind the overall increase in suicides over the last 30 years and the fact that states like lowa were not even included in the study!

Of course, most suicide deaths are not as mysterious as the one I described above. In many cases there are warning signs or even attempts at ending one's life. No matter how: the question that gnaws at the hearts and minds of all who are confronted with this sad reality is a huge, overwhelming "WHY?".

As members of a faith community, this unfortunate epidemic our culture is experiencing, should


and must be of concern to us. We might never become 'experts' or recognize dangerous potential of self-harm when we should. Nevertheless, the more we understand about the issue, the more we can at least ever so slightly work and speak against grave misconceptions and hurtful comments we may encounter.

'Reclaiming Life' is a 90-minute DVD I purchased many months ago. It features three people intimately involved in the pain of suicide, including Kay Warren, the wife of Saddleback Church founder, Pastor Rick Warren, whose son took his own life. She and another mother speak eloquently about the distinct set of emotional, moral and religious scars and the ache, chaos, stigma and darkness that only one who has survived it can understand. In addition to hearing these voices, I hope to give us opportunity to share concerns, ask questions and become more aware of how we as non-professional individuals can be brothers and sisters to each other as we face and hopefully prevent future deaths by choice and support those whose lives are forever changed by the agony it brings.

The days for getting together to view and discuss the DVD and join in conversation are Mondays, October 15th, October 22nd, and October 29th at 7:00 pm. We will meet for approximately 75-90 minutes each time. I believe the material will be appropriate for any young person over the age of

13 - we are highly aware of the significance of teen suicide! Please mark these dates on your calendar and feel free to bring along friends and neighbors.
