FROM THE PASTOR

A Grace-filled New Year is awaiting you!

By the time you read these musing, 2019 will have made its entrance. Like any other new year, it begins with endless possibilities: the opportunity to get better grades, the plan to become a kinder person, the chance to see your favorite football team make it to the Super Bowl.... On January 1st all is up for grabs....nobody knows yet what good or bad might come our way. In the dimming glow of the lights from the Times Square Ball and to the fading sounds of *Auld Lang Syne*, hopes and potential are in front of us.

I suppose that is why we engage in making resolutions. Aware of the 'newness' we want to help these open-ended possibilities along. So we work on our eating habits, count to 'ten' before we yell at the

kids, check out an educational book from the library or get up earlier so there is enough time for a little jog around the block before we head off to work. Been there, done that! \odot

It is fair to say that we are strange creatures, we

humans – we are well aware of how God created us ("a little lower than the angels" according to Psalm 8) and begrudgingly admit with St. Paul that we have "sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Romans 3). Our efforts to better ourselves in 2019 therefore are pre-ordained to be an exercise in frustration. The demands we place on ourselves can easily lead to despair when we have a sense that we, once again, have failed. We cannot 'fix' ourselves. We will always be saint and sinner simultaneously as Martin Luther warned and comforted us.

Of course, such realization shall not turn into an excuse to sit back and enjoy our failed attempts at excellence. Striving toward betterment, trusting that God can work with, in and through us, is imperative!

It is the ultimate gift of the Gospel: transformation is possible, lives can change, goodness will prevail!

But: none of that happens because of me or you but because of God and God alone. Saying that out loud and repeatedly helps us to stave off the trap of



self-righteousness and turns us back to God and especially to God's grace. The stress of our New Year's resolutions needs to meet the gift of grace that is ours in our Baptism when we were joined to the death and resurrection of Jesus so we may walk in newness of life (Romans 6). Luther writes that due to our Baptism our old creature must be drowned daily so we can truly live in that newness that is offered to us. Yet, as a famous theologian, Karl Barth, wrote, "The old creature is drowned in Baptism but it is a good underwater swimmer." As Luther said: saint and sinner!



When we turn toward God's grace we are not turning toward a foreign object or supernatural ingredient that God infuses into our lives so we "make it". Rather, thinking about Baptism, it becomes clear that grace is found in the person of Jesus, the One who came to us at Bethlehem and is manifested for the world once again in the words we hear during this coming Season of Epiphany. He is the One who gives of Himself and in Him alone we put our trust.



My own resolution for 2019 therefore is pretty simple: I will throw myself at the grace of God – that is what my life depends on after all is said and done and whether or not I fail or succeed at all the other plans, hopes and resolutions I have.

Let me close out with the words of a prayer that was found in the pocket of a Confederate Soldier at the end of the Civil War: I asked God for strength, that I might achieve; I was made weak, that I might learn humbly to obey. I asked for health, that I might do greater things; I was given infirmity, that I might do better things. I asked for riches, that I might be happy; I was given poverty, that I might be wise. I asked for power, that I might have the praise of men; I was given weakness, that I might feel the need of God. I asked for all things that I might enjoy life; I was given life, that I might enjoy all things. I got nothing I asked for but everything I hoped for. Almost despite myself, my unspoken prayers were answered. I am, among men, most richly blessed. So are we: most richly blessed. Happy New Year! PZ+

STEWARDSHIP MUSINGS

I did not read it myself but heard many good things about a book by an esteemed businessman named Peter Drucker, Managing the Non-Profit Organization. I found this interesting quote: "A business has discharged its task when the customer [seeks out] the product, pays for it, and is satisfied with it. Government has discharged its function when its policies are effective. The non-profit institution supplies neither goods, services or controls. Its product is neither a pair of shoes nor an effective regulation. Its product is a changed human being. The non-profit institutions are human change agents. Their product is a cured patient, a young man or woman grown into a self-respecting adult; a changed human life altogether." Mr. Drucker also says: "When a church is consistently showing its constituency how lives are being changed through its ministry, then that church is supported."

A wise Physician said,
The best medicine for humans is
"CARE and LOVE"
Someone asked, if it doesn't work?
He smiled and answered
"INCREASE THE DOSE"

What he is saying, I think, is this: when we buy a pair of shoes, we expect a good return on our investment. When a store does a good job of selling a quality product at a fair price, people keep buying from that store. So far, so easy.

Of course, your financial statement which lists your contributions makes very clear what Peter Drucker eloquently states: at Emmanuel we do not offer goods and services in return for your contribution other than those of a spiritual nature. Which, for me, is a yearly reminder of the fact that my job is not very tangible! How does anyone measure a sermon or a hospital call or a counseling session or a Baptism? You might like or dislike it – but, you ask ten people and you get ten different answers, right?!



Our "product" is a changed human being, Peter Drucker asserts. I am not sure that we can measure that with ease. In order to see and hear such we must be mindful of our neighbor. Perhaps then we will see how being in our community on Sundays gives a person hope and strength for the week ahead; or how the child who comes across a story of Jesus for the first time can hardly wait to come for the next lesson; or we can observe the young person who thinks he is not worth much but finds great affirmation in being asked to help with a task, gets a kind 'thank-you' and suddenly his life counts again. I am sure you can supply your own examples from the contacts you have.

And then there are those things which we can indeed measure – or at least from our vantage point. We see the money we give to the larger church, or the funds that go to many and various organizations. Through their letters of acknowledgement, or through visits as with our Mission Fest speakers, we learn how our gifts impact the lives of real people close by and/or far away. The effect of our gifts most likely is very tangible for the beneficiaries – even if not clearly visible to us personally, perhaps. By sending our hard-earned money 'away', we are changing human lives-just as we do right here in the wider Grafton community for those whose secret needs might only be known to few.

Have you ever thought of yourself as a 'human change agent'? Perhaps we must not underestimate

ourselves in what we are and what we do. We might change others – and others might change us. Such is the nature of Stewardship. The reason why you and I are supporting Emmanuel Lutheran Church is really much less about money as it is about changing human lives, my friends. PZ+

It is always good to be reminded that Christmas is not quite over but continues until the season of Epiphany arrives on January 6th. The length of this season varies, depending on the date of Ash Wednesday. "Epiphany" comes from the Greek "to show forth" and is observed as the period of time in the church year that offers us a glimpse into the manifestation, or appearance, of Christ. When the Christ-Child was presented in the temple, old Simeon prophesied that Jesus would be 'a light to the Gentiles'. The visitation of the Magi begins that manifestation. Until the fourth century, the birth and the baptism of Jesus were commemorated on the day of Epiphany. Our liturgical color for the Day of Epiphany is white to emphasize purity, joy and light. Eastern Churches, following the Julian calendar, observe the Feast on what for us is January 19th - because of the 13-day difference between that calendar and the generally used Gregorian calendar. In many Western Christian Churches, the Eve of the Feast is celebrated as Twelfth Night, the conclusion of the Twelve Days of Christmas. In 2019 the Epiphany Season concludes on the 5th of March and we observe Ash Wednesday the following day.



...that the Jordan River where Jesus was baptized was land-mined following the 1967 Six-Day War and declared a military zone? Booby traps were placed in seven monasteries in the area and declared off limits to the public. Currently a team of Israelis, Palestinians and Georgians is clearing up the area west of the river. The project should be finished by the end of 2019. The territory, which belonged to Jordan before the war, was a popular tourist site.

....that an Armenian family facing deportation took refuge in a church in the Netherlands in late October? Since Dutch law prohibits civil authorities to enter church sanctuaries while worship services are in progress. 400 pastors and laity from all over the Netherlands have come to the Protestant Church The Hague to lead continuous worship. The family had fled to the Netherlands in 2010 after the father received death threats for political activism. The Dutch government had originally granted the family asylum and then withdrew it. The worship service began on October 26th at 1:30 pm and has not yet come to a conclusion.

...that church members who have children with autism are twice as likely not to attend worship as families whose children have other health issues?

Andrew Whitehead, a sociologist and father of children with Autism, conducted a study after his own family was discouraged from attending worship because their children were too 'disruptive' to other worshippers.
