
Growing Old - Staying Faithful

In early April Michael and I observed our 43rd wedding anniversary. I know: too late to complain and too early to gloat! Even though nowadays an anniversary like that can be considered "a feat", I still marvel at the couples in our congregation who have celebrated 50, 60 or even 70 years of married life. Yet, even for us "kids", it was a reminder that we now have much more history with each other than with our families of origin. Moreover, simple math tells us that the majority of our lives, together and individually, is now well behind us. When we talk about the future we do not mention 'decades' any longer but rather 'years'.

Let's face it: there comes the point when we are reminded that we are creatures, mortal beings who, no matter how feverishly we try to escape it, have an unbreakable date with death. We watch grandparents and parents struggle with their loss of independence and increasing vulnerability. And then, as out of

the blue, comes the moment when we are frustrated that we ourselves cannot do what we once were able to do. We start lamenting that once simple tasks can be maddeningly difficult. We get used to aches and pains but are surprised that bad knees and cataracts are not for the faint of heart

Some of us grow old gracefully and some of us don't. I do not mean whether or not we 'look our age'. Looks are indeed deceiving when it comes to age and how we handle it. Rather, it is not unusual for some of us to come to a certain point in life when we assume that we no longer have any-



thing to contribute to life and society; some even sense that they are not wanted anymore and that their personhood value has been diminished. We all know elderly men and women who become very distraught after what once was important to them has been reduced to memories, often combined with the loss of employment,

the death of spouses or friends or the relocation of children far away from home.



When I visit our elderly members I relish the opportunity to receive the gift of time from them. Slower speech, slower movements and sometimes a slower thinking process allow me to appreciate the fact that life is more than running from one appointment to the next. As they slow down so I am forced to slow down with them and live in the moment. That is a gift! Time becomes a gift to let a relationship unfold rather than a commodity to be spent or saved. I almost always leave my cellphone in my car when I visit with our homebound members. To a certain extent, time stands still – or at least, it doesn't seem to move quite as rapidly. Welcome to my life, time!

Growing older certainly has its challenges and we shall not diminish that fact! For some of us these challenges set in fairly early; others enjoy good health, meaningful relationships and exciting activities well into their late nineties. When we are in need of receiving care we encounter another responsibility that comes with advanced age and decreasing abilities: we need to remind ourselves that our care givers need to take care of themselves! I have heard, observed and learned that it can be even more difficult to deal with the limitations of a spouse or parent than it is dealing with one's own. One cannot give what one does not have!

As Christians we are reminded that our calling, our *vocation* as we say, never ceases. In

Baptism we are starting our journey of discipleship and while that journey will certainly look very different in each stage of our lives, it will never cease until our life's end. We are always called to live for God and for others - just like those around us are called to live for God and us. Retirement, poor health and significant limitations of mind do not take away our vocation – they will only adjust them. God cares for the world through us. We are the hand and feet of Christ and we give others the opportunity (as Martin Luther loved to say!) to be 'little Christs' to us when we are unable to do for ourselves what once was natural and easy. We are never exempt from our responsibility for our neighbor and: we are always useful to God and through us God blesses others – at any age! Even very old age then can be a time for growth, enrichment and deepening holiness.



Many of us narrow our circle of concern as we grow older; we are more selective with what we do, whom we see, where we go and sometimes even whom we want to love and care for. And, the older we get the more we are often occupied with our own needs. Very understandable, of course! I already have to admit to that - but, I do not feel good about it.

You see, I am convinced that even in advanced age we are still called to imitate Christ by the witness of our lives. We are more than victims to the losses, sorrows and occasional humiliations advanced age brings with itself. There is a fine line between honoring your age and realizing

your limitations and "giving up" on living before it is called for.

I will never forget the words of a friend after her husband died at age forty-seven of bone cancer; their two sons barely teens when their father passed away. She said: "Ben and I had only sixteen years of marriage but they were sixteen wonderful years. This is a much greater blessing than having to say that we had fifty horrible years."

This always reminds me that aging and death are not the worst that could happen to us. The worst perhaps would be to live a life of bitterness, self-centeredness and without care and love for others. And the opposite of that, a life of joy, generosity and love, can be lived at any age. God gives us that opportunity at every stage of our being.

Many people can teach us a thing or two of seeing the loving and providing hand of God in even the most difficult of circumstances. Think of the elderly people in your own life who have generously given of themselves, their time and their wisdom when you needed it most. I bet both of you were blessed by it! Both of you found meaning in life because of it. Both of you were living out your calling with and through one another! What a gift. I see it here at Emmanuel Lutheran every week.



Christians are hardy realists about growing old. The infirmities that come upon us with illness,

diminished capacities and increasing disability are easier to curse than to embrace. Christians don't believe that growing old and suffering loss is easy, but they do believe it can be blessed and rich in hope. That's because our lives are forever bounded by the love and goodness of God that brought us into being in the first place, sustains us through the years and is with us in the passage from death into eternal life.

Flood Relief Donations



Over 60,000 homes were damaged in the Midwest flood this Spring. Some of the most damaged areas are in Nebraska and South Dakota. The NALC Disaster Relief will be dispatching Volunteer groups to Dannebrog, NE, the Danish Capital of the State. The Dannebrog area is home to Faith Lutheran Church, a NALC congregation. Many homes are destroyed or significantly damaged. FEMA is working with families but even those with Flood Insurance are looking at tremendous expenses that will not be covered. The NALC Disaster Relief is planning on helping with clean-up and rebuilding. To that end they are looking for donations with which to purchase gift cards to businesses that can provide building materials - like Home Depot, Lowe's, Menards, etc.

Throughout the month of May, Emmanuel
Lutheran will collect funds which we will forward
to Mary Bates, the NALC Disaster Coordinator.

DID YOU KNOW

...that the Seminary of the NALC is now entering into partnerships with undergraduate institutions? In this spirit, they envision a closer integration of the undergraduate and



postgraduate (seminary) phases of education, in order to eliminate unnecessary repetition and reduce the time and cost to complete the Master of Divinity (M.Div.) degree, without either sacrificing academic rigor or minimizing the importance of the relational and formational aspects of a residential seminary education. Toward this end, they have established cooperative arrangements with three Lutheran undergraduate institutions: Concordia College New York in Bronxville, N.Y.; Concordia University St. Paul in St. Paul, Minn.; and Grand View University, in Des Moines, Iowa. A student majoring in theology at any of these schools could fulfill the introductory requirements for the Master of Divinity. A student at Grand View University or Concordia University St. Paul taking the full slate of courses with Seminary equivalencies could complete a B.A. in theology and an M.Div. in a total of six years plus internship, instead of the typical seven, with the resulting cost savings.

...that 59% of pastors polled believe that sports betting is morally wrong? Only 31% of all Americans are opposed to it. The research follows the 2018 Supreme Court decision to strike down the law prohibiting state-authored sports betting outside Nevada.

...that 50% of all American adults think that religion will be less important in 2050?

...that Emmanuel was once again the recipient of a Grant from WCDA? This gracious gift will allow us to replace some furnaces in the office/education wing and engage a firm to do tuck pointing around the church edifice.

...that May 19th will be the last day of Sunday School? The kids will sing during worship. Parents, please mark this on your calendar! We also will take the Noisy Offering on that day.

...that VBS in Bolan will be the week of June 3rd, Monday through Friday from 9 am through noon. We will be sending registration forms home with students over the next few weeks in Sunday



School. If your child does not bring home a form, there will be additional forms in the kiosk in the lower narthex. Pastor Z will again offer rides - but: please no last-minute arrangements!!!

Nobody minds if a child gets a bit confused in the hustle of the activity and forgets to go toward a pew or two. I see the smiles on your faces during the collection and I am never sure if my heart is warmed more by your collective smiles or by watching the kids having a great time being part of the worship service. The Noisy Offering leads me to think about Stewardship for our little ones. I remember the coins my parents used to place in my hands when I walked to Sunday School. I was not as lucky as some of my peers and did not pass any bubble gum machines or the like on the way to class and therefore indeed put my money into the offering plate at the beginning of our time together – not all unlike we are doing at Emmanuel right now.

With a slight cringe I also remember using a portion of my weekly allowance to put into the offering plate during worship when I, at the age of eleven, started to walk to Sunday worship services. My parents would not give me money for both – worship *and* Sunday School. My husband and I used a rather different method when we raised our sons and I trust it has not been lost on them.

There is much to be said when it comes to helping children understand the concept of 'giving' – even before they know what a 'concept' is! And parents are the number one teachers - providing a living example. Yes, parents, when you come to


worship place a coin or bill into the hands of even the youngest ones (yes, even if you will give them a quarter for Sunday School, too!) and let them see that you too participate in the collection of the Offering by adding your check, envelope or cash to it. No, you do not have to try to explain 'sacrificial giving' to your three-year old but

being a steward yourself and giving them the opportunity to participate as well, you instill a wonderful, life-long, blessed habit in your children. If it helps, think of it like the daily reminder: *be sure to brush your teeth*. If you give electronically explain to your children that you already have put your money into the church's offering before the service started. Children know instinctively that money is part of life and that sometimes it is good to keep it and sometimes it is good to share. Many parents teach children the meaning of saving money early on – a good habit, too!

The point of all this is certainly not that Emmanuel or any other church community, will not survive or thrive unless all first graders place a dollar in the offering plate. The point is to show your children that everything we have is a gift from God and placing an offering – however small or large – in the offering plate during worship is one of the very small ways in which we say "Thank you" to God and share with a world that is hurting and in need to attention. Parents form habits in



their children - even the one of being a faithful steward. PZ+


