Remember to turn your clocks back an hour next Sunday, November 3rd...

In Germany, as around the world, Luther is honored and remembered as a national hero not only for his theology but also because his translation of the Bible into a language accessible to the common folk, influenced the development of the modern German language and in many ways laid the foundation for the educational system.

The printing press, perfected by Johann Gutenberg around 1450, was new to Luther's world and Luther made good use of it! Words poured out of Luther – lectures, sermons, statements, essays, pamphlets, hymns, the catechism, letters and much more. Today the scholarly German edition of Luther's writings number well over 60,000 pages in more than 100 volumes.

But above all, his words were about the Word of God, the inspired Word of Scripture and the Word made flesh, Jesus the Christ. Luther's hope always was to turn his beloved church to the truth of God so that all would come to know the salvation which comes by God's grace through faith in Jesus, not by our own efforts. As far as Luther was concerned, he did nothing to bring about the Reformation. "The Word did everything," he declared.



Hours before his death, Luther was asked if he wanted to die standing firm in Christ and the doctrines he had taught. His answer: "Yes". After his death, in his coat pocket, a scrap of paper was found. Luther had made notes about the humility in the presence of God's Word and the statement that we must never imagine that we have mastered God's Word. His final written words are these: "We are beggars. This is true." Yes, we have nothing to offer God in exchange of the blessings we receive. God alone saves us by the Word made flesh.
