FROM THE PASTOR

Thanksgiving again - NOW WHAT?

Thanksgiving is coming. Thanksgiving is a time when we are willing to live with high gas prices or crowded airport security lines in order to come together with family and friends. It is a time for us to roll ourselves up to tables which are groaning under the weight of a sacrificial turkey with all the 'trimmings' and a sliver of pie. If you are in charge of this calorie-laden extravaganza for your loved ones, you surely will move forward with the concentration of a general planning an invasion.



If you are a serious shopper who has all Black Friday deals circled, you may be sharpening your machetes so they can cut a swath through the crowds and be first in line for the super-sale. And others, well, others of us will make plans to oil the buttons on our TV remote control and memorize the schedule for the football games.

Really, hardly any of these beloved Thanksgiving traditions have a great deal to do with "giving thanks." I want to be fair: I know that many, many of us are grateful. We give thanks for reasonable health, a decent job, good relationships, loving children, faithful spouses, and a nation blessed and filled with freedoms. Therefore, it is indeed right and salutary that we come together in worship and prayer,

praising Him from whom all blessings flow.

Still, in our more honest moments, we might well end up confessing



that going to Thanksgiving worship is a major speed bump which serves to slow down our stampede to the banquet table. After all, Thanksgiving is not a High Feast Day in the church (here, I just gave you the perfect excuse – remember it!). And yet: we know we shouldn't feel that way! We want our thanks to be sincere, but something seems to be missing; something seems to be wrong. Deep down inside of us, where nobody else can hear, there is a nagging, and a gnawing, that seems to short-circuit our thanksgivings and keeps us searching for a special something which can miraculously make us thankful. That little voice of discontent keeps urging us, driving us, teasing us. It says we can only be thankful when we are content. It tells us we can only be content when we have enough. And then it tells us we will never have enough.

The Japanese have an old parable that tells of a man by the name of Tasuku. Tasuku was a poor man who scrimped out a livelihood by cutting blocks of stone from the base of a mountain. One day, a well-dressed prince passed by. Tasuku envied the prince and wished that he could have the kind of security that a prince's wealth could offer. If he had that security, Tasuku reasoned, he could truly be thankful. According to the legend, Tasuku's wish was heard, and he was miraculously made a prince. Tasuku, for the first time in his life, felt secure. He had guards.

He had an army. He could give thanks.



That secure feeling lasted not more than a few hours. It lasted until the sun came out, and with great intensity, beat down upon Tasuku's guards and army. Soon his men were suffering from the heat and falling by the wayside. Tasuku no longer felt secure. He could not give thanks. No, he wanted to be secure and strong, like the sun. His wish was heard. Tasuku became the sun. Now he could dry up the fields, scorch the crops, send folks searching for shade.

Tasuku was secure; now he could give thanks. But then a storm cloud covered him. He became sad.

He made another wish; was granted another change. He became a great cloud, having the power to send storms and floods upon the land. Now Tasuku was secure. Now he could be thankful. But his time of thanksgiving was interrupted when he saw a mountain that had remained untouched by his storms. So Tasuku wished, and became the mountain. Now he was secure. Now he could give thanks. He could be thankful forevermore. And he was, until he felt the chisel of a simple stonecutter chipping at his base. Tasuku never found thanksgiving, because he never found security for his heart.

Of course, this is merely a story. It could never happen, could it? Scripture says, "Godliness, with contentment is great gain" (1 Tim 6:6). And still, our little voices tell us that we need just this one more thing to be truly fulfilled. The reality of life is this: nobody, at least nobody in this world, has the ability to make you secure. Nothing, at least nothing in this world, can give you total peace.




Jesus, the ultimate reason for us to give thanks, also was a story teller, as you know. One of his famous stories begins with a rich landowner who brought in a bumper crop. It was so big that his existing barns were obviously inadequate. His was the kind of problem that most farmers I know dream of.

Stuck with this delightful dilemma, the man decided to tear down his old barns and build new ones to store the grain. After that, he finally would be able to sit back and relax (Luke 12:16-19)

The farmer's plan seemed good on paper. Except: among the many things he had considered, among the many paths he thought his life might take, he never considered the possibility of death. He never thought he might need God's help. Jesus says, "that night the man died." In spite of his plans, in spite of his wealth, in spite of his harvest, he died. His security

was insecure; his future was fleeting; his tomorrows were terminated.



If we think we can live without

God, we are mistaken. If we think we can be secure without God, we are wrong. If we think we can be content without Christ, we are incorrect. Earthly security is a myth. Thanksgiving only comes when the heart and the soul are secure.

With hearts and souls secure, the martyrs of ancient Rome went to their death singing. They died in cruel ways, but they went thanking God. Saint Paul traveled the ancient world, hounded, hunted, persecuted; but he had a heart that was secure, a soul that could give thanks. He wrote to the church at Rome, "I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord." (Romans 8:38-39)

Do you see the great gift God is offering here? It is possible for us, in our lives, right now and always, to be secure; for our hearts, right now and always, to be filled with true thanksgiving. Having Jesus Christ as your Savior makes everything different. The way we see the world – different. The priorities of our lives –

different. Our goals and the things which are important to us – different.

Jesus, who was born to save us, who lived His life to rescue us, who fulfilled the law to free us from our sins, brings about a heart of thanksgiving. In Jesus we are safe and secure.

I am not sure whether or not the following is merely an exaggerated tale but it demonstrates what we want to remember: a young African woman, who had recently become a Christian, was attending church. The minister spoke about giving thanks to the Lord. After the sermon, the offering plate was passed. The young woman was poor. She had nothing to give; no money, no earthly belongings. Yet, as the offering plate came to her, she did not pass it. She got up, set the plate on the floor, and stood in it. A secure soul. A thankful heart.

May your Thanksgiving be bountiful and filled with a thankful heart knowing that you are secure in Jesus. PZ+

STEWARDSHIP MUSINGS

One of the things I have noticed lately is an increased interest in the plight of homelessness. My own experience with homeless people is extremely limited and I am far from being a voice for the homeless. Yet, as we have experienced the first frosty nights in North Iowa, I have indeed wondered how I would feel sleeping not in my cozy house but on the slabs of cement in my front yard. I am not a social activist, but I am bothered by that thought.



In my first years as a pastor I encountered a middle-aged man with a severe case of diabetes. He stopped at my office and I took him to the closest homeless shelter. The shelter was north of our town and he wanted to go south. A few days later, the Sheriff came to my office wondering if I knew anything about a man who had been found dead by the Lock and Dam alongside the Mississippi. Well, you know the answer: it was my diabetic travel companion who had gone into a coma while trying to wander into warmer regions. My only other encounter with a number of homeless men and women was in a Shelter at a church in Green Bay where my congregation served a meal on a cold latewinter evening. Our limited efforts to provide a decent supper were rewarded with exceeding gratefulness. It was indeed humbling to see how the clients made their 'beds' in the corner of the old gym.



One of the places where homelessness is rampant is San Francisco. Reports and pictures of so-called 'tent cities' have reached even our wind-swept prairie. By all means, one must agree that the situation is out of hand. I certainly would not want 4th Avenue in Grafton lined with tents! One can hardly blame the citizens who are fed up and have taken matters into their own hands, collected a few thousand dollars via Facebook and bought boulders to keep the homeless as well as alcohol and drugs out of their front yards. Apparently the boulders were not big enough to do the trick and those who put up the boulders became targets of threats. The struggle continues and the 10,000 homeless of the city are still there. Boulders are not the answer, it seems!?!

Homelessness is not only an urban or suburban problem but a rural issue as well. I have no clue how to solve it! I don't even know that I have any preference on how I wish people would respond to it! Neither do I blame anyone for having a strong opinion one way or the other. Yet, I do know that I had better give it some thought because this all happens on the planet on which I live and work and have my being. I also know that many reasons can lead to homelessness with mental health concerns and addiction being right up there. But, it is easy to fall on hard times.

We saw that about ten years ago and some of us remember well the farm crisis of the 1980s.

Dayspring Children's Village intervenes in the lives of at-risk children in rural South Africa through Christian education and care to enable them to fulfil their God given destiny and impact the world for Christ. Their passion is intervention in both the lives of children and families to create a secure, loving, affirmative home environment. The school was established in 1983 and currently there are 89 children boarding Mon. to Fri. and 10 who stay weekends through the term. In 1995, Kim Katuta (nee Thorsfeldt from Northwood) met a couple in Jerusalem, who had volunteered at the school. Kim originally meant to stay 3 months to 'help out' at the school in 1996 but God had other plans and 23 years later, she is now the General Manager of the organization.

There is a chance that Kim Katuta also will be with us as she is in the States right now to obtain her needed visa to return to South Africa. You will hear about Dayspring Children's Village during worship as well as via a presentation following worship with the opportunity to ask questions. February - Go Make Disciples of all Nations

The dove represents the coming of the Holy Spirit. The cross stands for the crucifixion. The orb is the world and the circle around it stands for eternity.



The Earth is the Lord's

May - The Earth is the Lord's

"Unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains alone; but if it dies, it bears much fruit." This seemingly lifeless grain of wheat is placed in the ground in anticipation that it will burst from the ground in new life.



March - By his Wounds You are Healed

Christ died for our sins. Through the death of Jesus, our sins are forgiven, we are reconciled to God, our debts have been canceled – we are restored to wholeness.

June - Voyage into the Future

Nave, the main body of the church building, where the congregation is seated, is the Latin word for ship. Therefore "Christ's church on earth" is rightly called the ship of salvation, sailing the deep waters of life.





July - From Generation to Generation

The circle around the people shows the continuous generation to generation. The vine shows love interwoven around this circle. The cross and the heart shows the love of Christ in their hearts.
