FROM THE PASTOR

THE SEASON OF DEEP LONGING

One of the things I remember rather vividly from my childhood is the Advent Calendar my parents would bring out on the first day of December. For twenty-four days I would open a little "door" each morning. Behind the "door" was a piece of chocolate in the form of a Christmas image, religious or secular. On Christmas Eve the chocolate piece was much larger and always came in form of the manger scene with Mary, Joseph and the baby Jesus.

This tradition was important enough to me that we continued it when our children were small. As a matter of fact, after moving to America, my family would send us these calendars so the boys could maintain the excitement.



Over the decades these calendars have found their way into the American scene of pre-Christmas

staples. Some calendars now have poems or Scripture verses behind their "doors". But, such is not the end! As I learned fairly recently, one of the larger grocery store chains, with its roots in the German market, offers Advent Calendars with cheese or wine or even beer. Apparently they are selling out fast and the availability is very limited. Of course, these little calendars are not so little any longer and neither are they cheap. Now, I have absolutely nothing against a good chunk of cheese. Wine is fine as well and I can tolerate beer if I have to. As far as consumer enticement goes, one has to hand it to the company - unique, indeed. But, I am truly stretching my imagination trying to figure out what all of this has to do with preparation for Christmas – other than being well trained for gluttonous eating and drinking, perhaps.

If I am honest with myself -- and I am absolutely <u>not</u> prone to cry after the "good old days" -- I have noticed many changes even in my own life that have taken away from of the importance of the season. Germans speak of Advent with the fondness of "Besinnlichkeit", perhaps best translated as "contemplativeness".

At our home we have two different Advent wreath options. Both are lovely and in years past we would faithfully light the candles – one more each week until the Christ- Candle in the middle shone bright on Christmas Day. Often we would sit

around the wreath, tea cup in hand, talking or singing a hymn and reading a seasonal devotion. It still amazes me to realize that I nevertheless had enough time to do my work, take care of my kids and do the laundry. This time of "Besinnlichkeit" never seemed to take away from our responsibilities nor add stress. Not so much nowadays. The Advent wreath has not yet made it out of storage and onto the living room table. If we light the candles, it probably won't be until I am done with the Christmas Day service (when I am basically comatose anyway! (a)) and so forth...



The Advent Season by definition includes a deep and holy longing. In our lessons during Advent worship we hear the words of the prophets to Israel. God's chosen people longed for God to come and redeem them. They had experienced many struggles and even when life was peaceful and content something was missing. It probably is not much different today. For most of us life is fine or at least 'okay'. We would like to walk through this season with gladness and laughter and celebrate the true light, Jesus, who has been promised to us as the only remedy that will dispel the darkness of our hearts, lives and world.

But, all of us know that just because the Church says it is Advent, we will not escape the struggles of our days. Grief, loneliness, anger, hostility, ill health, fractured relationships – they all are still here. Peace still escapes us and we all know that we often simply put on a smiling face so we do not get accused of being a 'spoil sport'.

Yet – during Advent we live and wait in hope as we remember the ways in which our God in Christ has come and promises to come again for us. Advent means 'Coming". God has come in the incarnate lesus. He continues to come through Christ who is

present in the hearing of the Word and in the tangible gift of the Sacraments. Moreover, Jesus will come again to bring to completion the entire work of salvation that God began in the birth of the babe at Bethlehem-Jesus, the same yesterday, today, and forever.

To grasp all of that, we need some time for reflection before we rush to kneel at the manger. The Church was wise in giving us this time. Let's not ignore it or consider it obsolete.

The Advent Season of 2019 is short with the first Sunday of Advent falling on the first day of December. My encouragement is that we make the best out of it by giving in to our deep longings for the world and for ourselves. With the prophets let us be convinced that even in the darkest of days our restoration to full and everlasting life is never in question. "The zeal of the Lord of hosts will do this", Isaiah tells us.

Of course, Advent brings us to Christmas. If Christmas is indeed as important as we say it is (and it IS!), we had better be prepared. Nobody rushes into a wedding without preparations. Nobody goes on a trip without preparations. Nobody buys a home without proper preparations, financial, personal, legal or otherwise. Why do we so often think we can truly understand what God is doing in the miracle of the Incarnation without any contemplation and preparation? Frankly, we can't.

I don't have an old-fashioned Advent calendar and I am not interested in the ones with cheese, wine or beer. But I still have my Advent wreath with four large candles, one for each Sunday of the season. I still have tea to brew; I still know some Advent hymns that can be sung and I am sure we can find something to talk about and a devotion to read at my house. I know I have a deep and holy longing in my heart that only God can fill. And so do you. And all of us have a promise: "The zeal of the Lord of hosts will do this."

May God bless you as you walk through this season of deep holy longings and trust that they will be fulfilled. PZ+

...that Bible Study and Confirmation classes will resume the week of January 6th?



The current President, Dr. Amy Schifrin, will continue to teach at the Seminary until her full retirement.

It is a reminder to us during this Thanksgiving season, that we be always thankful for God and the things he does in our life. He is the "Almighty God of the Universe." The meeting opened with the reading of the purpose. Secretary minutes from October were approved as corrected: We will be sending layettes (not quilts) and activity/school kits . Treasurer reports \$3,318.08 in checking. There are a few outstanding bills to pay. A thank you from the Northern Lights Alliance for the Homeless was read. Correspondence from Living Waters Cluster was shared.
