FROM THE PASTOR



What are YOU looking for? Why do YOU find yourself in a church pew on Sundays? There are plenty of reasons and excuses to stay home, correct? For one: the weather! Plus, there are plenty of personal reasons and excuses we can point to. Some reasons and excuses why people stay away from worship have to do with the institutional church. And, yes, there are the reasons and excuses why folks do not want to worship at Emmanuel Lutheran Church in Grafton. So, we could look at long lists, couldn't we?

Surely, it is true: there is a deep hunger in the human heart and soul and every kind of spirituality is trying hard to fill in the gaps for us – there are crystals, herbs, Native American rituals, Zen meditations, you name it.

It is good to know that we are not alone in our search. See this passage from the Gospel of St. John: The next day John the Baptist saw Jesus coming towards him and declared, 'Here is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world! This is he of whom I said, "After me comes a man who ranks ahead of me because he was before me."...The next day John again was standing with two of his disciples, and as he watched Jesus walk by, he exclaimed, 'Look, here is the Lamb of God!' The two disciples heard him say this, and they followed Jesus. When Jesus turned and saw them following, he said to them, 'What are you looking for?' They said to him, 'Rabbi, where are you

staying?' He said to them, 'Come and see.' They came and saw where he was staying, and they remained with him that day.


What are you looking for, Jesus asks of John the Baptist's followers who were sort of hanging out around Jesus. When we are directly approached with a question like this, we often shrug our shoulders and say: oh, nothing, just killing time; not looking for anything specific; just hanging out.

True, sometimes we have no clue what we are really looking for, right?! We think we know what we want... but then again, maybe we don't. Likewise, sometimes we are too afraid to say what we want.

A number of years ago we took our granddaughter to Mason City and ended up at the Mall. When we were ready to leave, Victoria threw herself on the bench in front of the shoe store we had just walked through and started crying. It took

us many unsettling minutes of comforting, scolding, hugging, shaking fingers, and asking over and over again: what is wrong, what happened, what do you want, what are you looking for? Finally, amid deep sobs, she admitted that she wanted the pair of pink

high-top shoes she had seen in the store. We ended up buying the shoes and, to our surprise but gratefulness,





What are you looking for, Jesus asked. Well, the answer was peculiar: Where are you staying? the two men want to know from Jesus. Since you and I know the entire story - with John the Baptist having identified Jesus as the Lamb of God after baptizing him (not to mention the peculiarities around John's own birth and his Call to be the one to prepare the way of the Lord) - we rightfully wonder if it would not have been easier and more honest of John's students to say: Hey, we hear you are the answer to all our prayers...we are looking for salvation...your cousin told us about you....are you really the Lamb of God who takes away sins or is that an empty phrase and, besides, what does that mean anyway: the Lamb of God ... are you for real....we are curious and want to check you out....

Don't we have many questions about one another? Can I trust you? Will you pay attention to me? Is this a safe place to tell you what is really on my heart? Am I welcome here? What will you do if I turn out not to be the person you think I am? But, when we are asked what it is we want, it is so much easier to couch all of these questions in a dismissive, "I am just killing time." Or perhaps in throwing a temper tantrum in front of a shoe store. Or, as our biblical friends would say, "So, which hotel are you staying at, Jesus?"



Of course, people have always looked for different things in Jesus and we still do:

Those with ailments were looking for healing – yes,

we still pray for healing, cures and miracles this very moment. Those who questioned his legitimacy often were simply looking for a fight – perhaps that is the genesis of all these church fights within and

among denominations? Who or what is legitimate about Jesus and us? Just asking... Those excited by his miraculous abilities often yearned for entertainment – and entertainment today still promises to draw people to worship. Yet, then as now, the emptiness of entertainment becomes eventually evident. Those who were disillusioned with their faith wanted Jesus to give them a new spark – today we do that by church shopping...only to feel empty a few years later and start the search all over. Those who had deep economic needs looked for Jesus to be their personal food pantry (remember what happened to those who were fed with a few fish and loaves – they came back for more immediately and Jesus scolded them).



Today some preachers still try to get you to think that faith in Christ automatically provides you with "the good life". No, it doesn't. Those who loved the covenant Israel had with God and who had a good understanding of what it meant to be the Chosen People were looking to find a military leader in Jesus who would make Israel great again. Christians dealing with other world religions today must be mindful not to confuse defending the faith with fighting political battles and wars. Within our own faith tribe, we would be smart to recall that lesus does not deal in party platforms. Those who sought forgiveness and hope looked for a Savior then and still look and need one today! Jesus' answer to the two men who covered their interest in him with a question about hotel accommodations, received the answer the church now has given for 2000 years: Come and See.

Come and See goes beyond Jesus' willingness to show off his sleeping quarters and offer lemonade. Come and See is an invitation to a relationship with Jesus. For sure, Jesus is not a concept, a paradigm, yes, not even a conviction per se ... Jesus is a person who directly and clearly calls out to others, namely

us, to <u>come and see</u> who he is and what he is all about.

Who wants to sign on to a system of thinking, I ask you? When Jesus bids us to <u>come and see</u> that means for us to <u>go and die</u> to all that would distract us from him. When we hear the words '<u>Come and see</u>' our minds probably supply an additional phrase, something like this: don't take my word for it – get up and check it out for yourself!



Remember the Samaritan woman at the well who told her whole village to come and see - you won't believe this guy until you meet him!? The angel at the empty tomb shouted: Come and see - he is not here for he is Risen! Come and see is a twofold invitation. The first part says: let us go on a journey, let us embark on an adventure, let us take a pilgrimage, let us make a leap of faith. When Jesus issues that invitation and we follow it, we are not throwing ourselves into a dark hole, hoping that the bottom may be layered with pillows. This is different from playing the lottery or buying raffle tickets. Jesus' request to 'Come' means that he has a plan and a destination in mind for us. He knows what is going on, he knows what will happen to us and he is committed to being by our side as a steadfast companion. When Jesus says 'See', he gives us the opportunity to experience ourselves what he holds in store for us. Salvation does not happen by proxy but directly to you and me. Just like nobody can believe FOR you. Really, you have to believe yourself.



In our Baptism we have been called to be a public witness to the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world. Like John the Baptizer it is right and salutary, our duty and our joy,

to point to Jesus in the marketplace, the school, the office or the home and shout as John did: Behold, look, here is Jesus, the Lamb of God. And then we add the very words of Jesus: <u>Come and see</u>.

Stewardship Musings:

Many, if not most, months when I write these Stewardship Musings, I do not mention money. I have written about time, talents and issues like homelessness, plastic straws (years before most people paid attention to the matter!) and have shared Bible quotes and inspirational sayings. I have explained the difference between being owners and managers of what we have. Today I am not going to skirt around the issue but get to the core: Stewardship is indeed frankly and foremost about how we deal with our money. Of course, having been occupied for several weeks with our 2019 as well as the 2020 budget for Emmanuel, I should not be surprised that such comes to my weary mind.



I am certainly very pleased that we are carrying an overage into 2020 and it is obvious that we have been good stewards of what has been shared with us here at Emmanuel. Thank you to all who made that possible. Still, when I look at the division of the giving units that are shown in our Annual Report booklet, I am not exactly ready to get out my confetti and start a parade. While 'it all came out in the wash', there are plenty of giving categories that are decreased from last year. Yes, some of us have stepped up but lots of us have stepped down or not stepped anywhere.



Let me show you what it is I am speaking of: by way of example, the giving units that contribute between \$2,000 and \$4,000 per year have shrunk by 7 households from 17 to 10 households. If we assume (and it is truly only a mathematical assumption) that the average giver in that category


gave \$3,000 (exactly in the middle of the level), we took in \$51,000 from that group in 2018 and only \$30,000 in 2019. The drop of seven households in that giving range decreased our income by \$21,000. As you will agree, that is nothing to sneeze at, as they say. My point? We need to be mindful not to think that a cut-back in our personal contribution level does not matter. It does! You know how it goes: it's a penny here and a dollar there and pretty soon you are talking real money! ③

One of the Bishops in my former life used to tell the story of his father, a blue-collar worker from central Iowa. His theory was that he had to give three offerings: one for himself, one for the person who would love to give more but was truly unable to do so, and the third time for the person who refused to contribute. Therefore, based on his theory, he gave \$15 when he wanted to give \$5 and \$30 when he thought he needed to give \$10.



I heard the story about twenty-five years ago and it has stuck with me the entire time. Seldom have I encountered more Stewardship wisdom from all the learned folks who have spent decades to research the matter for congregations. The Bishop's father understood what it means to be a member of the household of God and of a specific faith family with various blessings, needs and behaviors - and he did his utmost best to play his part.

Looking at Emmanuel's financial future, I think I am suggesting just that: for you and I to do our utmost best. To keep in mind our own need and commitment 'to give' and the reality of the world around us....those who can't contribute at a level they desire due to circumstances beyond their control and those who simply won't contribute at a level that is right, honorable and God-pleasing. Come to think of it: even when we talk about money it is always about God and our neighbor, isn't it?



Our 2020 Lenten Season begins on February 26th, Ash Wednesday. On that day and every Wednesday until the beginning of Holy Week, we will gather under this theme:

BY HIS WOUNDS WE ARE HEALED.

While Jesus had no sins of his own for which he deserved to die, yet his enemies falsely accused him of violating every commandment of God. In each service we will see that it was our sin, our disobedience that Jesus bore in his body on the cross. The Lord laid on him the "iniquity of us all". Jesus suffered the penalty of death in our place, and indeed, by his wounds we are healed. Come and let us contemplate the Wounds of Blasphemy, the Wounds of Violating the Sabbath, the Wounds of Dishonoring Authority, the Wounds of Murder, the Wounds of Adultery and the Wounds of Stealing.

Each service, except Ash Wednesday, will be preceded by a Simple Supper provided by the members of our standing committees. You are asked for a free-will offering. This will provide you with the opportunity to be at worship without worrying about a meal for your family. Please see the calendar for times.



Lent is the season of the Christian liturgical calendar beginning on Ash Wednesday and leading up to Easter. Lent lasts approximately 6 weeks. The season is 40 days long, but it is celebrated over 46 days. This is because each Sunday of Lent is considered a 'mini Easter' and is not counted as part of the 40 day Lent observance. Many people think of Lent as a

particularly Roman Catholic practice, but Christians have observed the tradition of Lent since the early days of Christianity. Writings about the observance of Lent date back to the Council of Nicaea in 325 CE. And today, many Christian traditions and denominations—including, but not limited to the Roman Catholic Church, the Eastern Orthodox Church, Lutherans, Anglicans, Methodist, and some Reformed traditions—regularly observe Lent.

Lent is meant to be a time of spiritual preparation. The purpose of the 40 day length is to recall and parallel the 40 days of temptation that Jesus endured in preparation for his public ministry: Then Jesus was led by the Spirit into the wilderness to be tempted by the devil. After fasting forty days and forty nights, he was hungry. Matthew 4:1-2



Just as Jesus spent 40 days in the desert while spiritually preparing for his ministry, so too Christians are to spend Lent spiritually preparing for Easter. During this time, Christians are meant to focus on spiritual selfexamination, renewal, and growth. In many traditions, Lent is a time of fasting and abstinence. This is where the common "I'm giving up meat or chocolate for Lent" idea comes from. But, in addition to self-denial, Lent is also a time of active practices like alms-giving and acts of mercy, forgiveness, repentance and prayer. Many Christians 'give up' something during Lent in order to spend more time, money, or attention on these mentioned practices. These Lenten practices are a means to work in unison to prepare the heart to experience anew the power of Christ's suffering, death, and ultimately, his glorious Resurrection.




