## FROM THE PASTOR

### Don't forget to Tell the Stories of the Story

I consider it an absolute privilege to have ministered to almost 250 grieving families. With few exceptions, I even had the honor of sitting with them when they told stories about their lives with the person who was close to death. I have learned that this story-telling is an almost automatic response when we see a life slipping away. What did we do together? What are some of the memories we don't want to diminish or forget? When did we cry? When did we laugh? What made our family who we are today? As families sit together and share of their individual and communal recollection, stories become more complete, details are filled in and circumstances are crystallized.



Of course, more often than not, families have the big picture already figured out. Still, the telling of stories is invaluable, especially at the time of a death. It helps to put the life of the beloved person who is about to enter eternity into focus and it helps those left behind to see themselves in the fullness of a family story.

Our family did just that at the death bed of my mother-in-law. After 45 years with the family, I had heard many of the stories that were told and I even could add a few of my own. I was almost proud when my sister-in-law responded with a surprised "I didn't know that" to one of my memories. Likewise, I had to choke back tears when I learned that moments after a tornado destroyed Michael's parental home and barely spared the life of his mother and younger sister, my mother-in-law not only ran to the school to gather up her two older sons (I knew that!) but did so with broken glass in her shoes, giving no thought to the incredible pain it must have caused as the glass cut up her feet. What a testimony to motherly love.

The sad story about all of these stories is that we usually only tell them under circumstances that are not every-day events. The result of that, frankly, is that the younger generation misses out on knowing what formed their families into who they are.

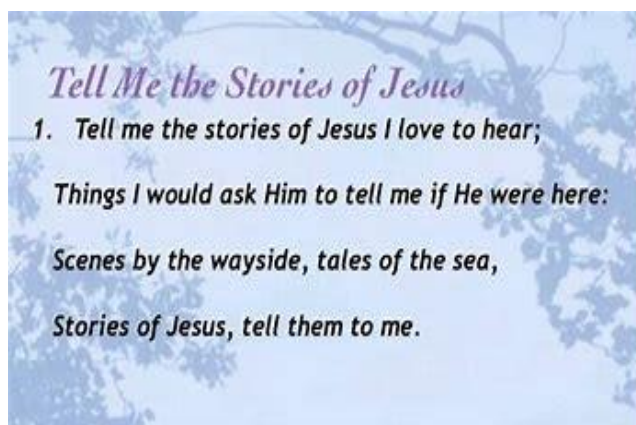
Story-telling has become a lost art; just like letter-writing and other human interactions that once were considered 'normal' or 'necessary' or 'appropriate'.

The Season of Lent is a perfect time to tell stories. In many ways we can say that it is the time when we are sitting at the deathbed of Jesus, holding vigil. However, the stories we want to tell need to go beyond us and focus on Jesus. Are we telling our children the stories of Jesus' suffering and death? Do we know enough about the events that led up to Holy



Week? What can we recall about the teaching, preaching, and healing ministry of our Lord so we can make sense out of his seemingly senseless death?

There is a reason why I require that our confirmands attend a certain number of Lenten services. The story we are telling during this time of the church year is what makes our faith family who we are. Like our family needs to know the story of a powerful tornado that killed eight people in the neighborhood and entirely altered the trajectory of our family forever, so your family needs to tell the stories that formed and shaped your lives. And, as a community of saints, we cannot understand who we are without the stories of our Lord who obediently followed the will of our heavenly Father and silently endured agony, insults and a cruel death.



We follow a Lord who hung on a cross, naked, bloody and God-forsaken... as onlookers had to assume. That indeed shapes us into a cruciform community – a people who understand that in suffering our Lord displayed his true glory. This story needs to be told so the story of the empty tomb on Easter Sunday makes any sense whatsoever.

Truly, my friends, to worship on Easter morning without having sat vigil at the deathbed of Jesus is counter-intuitive and I advise against it. We need the whole story!! We need to know it and we need to tell it!!

I have deeply treasured sitting with you and hearing your stories over the last seven plus years and I was surely blessed hearing the stories of our family throughout the last two weeks. Now let us sit and tell and hear the story of Jesus as we walk toward the cross. It is the story that makes us who we are. Telling stories with you – PZ+

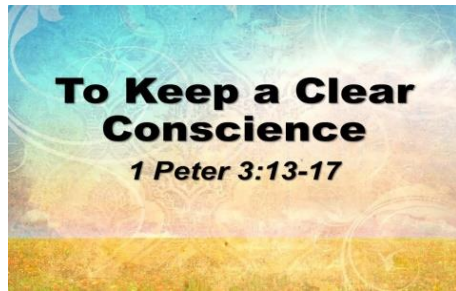

How would I be revenged of such an enemy, if I were in such a place of authority! How easily could I overthrow such a wasteful young man and compass his land, if I had but money to feed his humors! Those sins which we have never been able to do actually, to the harm of others, we do as hurtfully to our own souls by a sinful desire of them, and a sinful delight in the

## Stewardship Musings:

Raspberries have had an important place of special enjoyment in our family for many years. Seventeen springs ago, we planted our first bushes of the red delight. We actually did so in hopes that we would have grandchildren who would love to pick and eat them, like their grandmother, right off the branches without so much as a thought of washing them first. That is exactly what happened. When we moved to Grafton there was no doubt that raspberries had to be planted again. Perhaps because I am such a great lover of raspberries (well, everything that falls into the 'fruit category'), I was struck and moved to tears when I read a story about a single raspberry in a Nazi Concentration Camp.



I have not been to the New England Holocaust Memorial, but I have heard and read about it. Having seen other Memorial sites, I can image the impact it has on all who see it. I understand each of the six glass towers opens to the sky, symbolizing a chimney of a Nazi concentration camp. Steam rises eerily through metal grates at the base of each tower. Quotes from Holocaust survivors are etched into the glass. One of the quotes reads like this *"Ilse, a childhood friend of mine, once found a raspberry in the camp and carried it in her pocket all day to present it that night to me on a leaf. Imagine a world in which your entire possession is one raspberry and you give it to your friend."*

Frankly, I cannot imagine it. I am ashamed to say that I even hate to share a hand-full of the many, many berries I get to harvest. I am not confined to a camp, mistreated, in fear of losing my life, apart from my loved ones. I should be running through Grafton offering raspberries. You should be running around offering what???

We live a life of many options. Supposedly, the more choices we have, the less decisive we become. I believe that theory! Watch women go through Kohl's

or Macy's or men wander around Fleet Farm! ☺☹ After we choose whatever it is we think we wanted, we often find ourselves regretting the choice we made.

It seems to me that Ilse of Holocaust tragedy, had choices as well. She could have eaten the berry or thrown it away (if she didn't like fruit, that is), she could have kept it to eat later on or even show off with it to make others jealous. Giving it away was only one option. She chose the option that was self-less and generous, kind and deliberate. Perhaps she was giddy all day long knowing that she would bless a friend with the surprise of a ripe berry in the midst of a dingy, dark cabin that already had the foretelling smell of death.

Ilse's generosity is her legacy. Nothing could deter her. Not even the prospect of death under an evil regime. She truly gave all she had. It came to her as a surprise and she used it to bless someone who was a desperate as she was to make that person's day just a bit sweeter. Etched into glass, her stewardship and love have found lasting gratefulness. PZ+

Will check with Ron from Wilson Supply on chairs. 7) Hospitality Team Reorganization Report: Yvonne Tourtellott is willing to replace Judy Trenhaile as Team Leader for Team III. Other teams will remain the same and the number of teams will remain at nine. 8) Bible Study: Pew Sisters will be our study, books will be \$10; dates are April 13 & 27, May 4 & 18, and June 1, times to be determined.
