### I would pick more Daisies




my papers for at least twenty years and I could not help but smile when it fell into my hands. You might know this little poem as well:

We, communally, have become a very uptight people – perhaps not entirely of our own making, but... After close to 32 years of ministry, I have to admit that I find myself, as well as many people I encounter, much more anxious than three decades ago – and we had troubles then as well. I mourn this development for myself, my family and in general.



Yes, there is a deadly virus; yes, there are crazybanana politics; yes, there is economic turmoil and racial unrest and global issues seemingly beyond our control. Of course, most of these situations call for adjustments and renewed considerations in all that we do.

It seems fair and honorable to wonder: where do we go from here!? I think you know that I am not a clergy person who throws Bible verses around like clowns throw confetti at a Macy's parade. Perhaps you appreciate that, perhaps you don't. Either way: here is my take on the subject!



No matter where we are concerning any of the very important and even life-determining concerns of our days, a bit of introspection and contemplation might do us good. Beyond navel gazing or consultation within our "social bubble" where everyone thinks, votes and behaves like we do, that is. I therefore recommend God's Word. For myself!!! For you!!! 

Beginning on *Thursday, January 7th, at 9:30 am* our weekly Bible Study group will dive into St. Paul's letter to the Galatians. This is a rather personal letter and in it, Paul pours out his heart. His main concern in the letter is the question of what it means to believe and live in the Grace of God through Christ. What are the implications of coming to know and trust the Gospel? Studying Galatians is a little bit like snooping in somebody else's mail. Letters always presume a relationship between the writer and the recipient. If we find old family letters in the attic, we may have to read between the lines a bit to find the full context. Come and join us as we read the actual lines and the words between the lines as St. Paul speaks to his friends and to us.

### **STEWARDSHIP MUSINGS**

Our God is a God who works through means – through people and things, circumstances and opportunities. God can and has worked without "agency", as the Bible testifies (i.e. in Creation), but primarily, on the whole and for the most part, our God works through means. He does this not only for all of our earthly needs but also for all of our spiritual needs. And whenever God acts, it is to our benefit.

God gives us fathers and mothers to care for us when we are young. Many of us had/have the blessing of grandparents who can share wisdom and extra attention when others are busy with life and work. Through our families, God provides house and home, food and clothing, education and training in those areas that speak to our talents, gifts and interests.

Lutherans believe that it is God who provides good government to protect us from harm and

danger. Which is not to say that every Prime Minister. President, Chancellor or office holder is ultimatelv selected and ordained by God Himself and cannot or must not be challenged – often God works in spite of those we elect. Yet.



God is not removed from what happens in the secular realm of our lives and works always within it. We call it the Kingdom of the Left. We even need to be clear that, as far as the secular realm of our life is concerned, we shall not be surprised if God uses us to step up and declare: thus says the Lord! The sovereignty of God never must be undermined or diminished. The First Commandment is always our gauge – and it happens to be the one we surely break more often than not.


What else does God provide? He gives us neighbors and good friends to help in times of need, to celebrate or cry with us and sometimes even to fill in for family when distance or circumstances call for it. God provides for our most mundane needs like food, shelter and clothing by lifting up our work so we can be gainfully employed and take care of ourselves and our families. Our physical strength and our cognitive abilities, which lead us into trades and professions of various sorts, are not accidental to our lives. At our Baptism we are commissioned to let our light shine so others may see our good works and glorify our Father in heaven'. What a perfect expression to remind us that all good gifts and abilities simply coincidental are not and happenstance, but indeed come from our heavenly Father who blesses us deliberately and personally. Yet, we get to share them - and even enjoy the adulation, success, reward and gladness that comes from offering up what God has placed into our lives. We contribute by extension to the goodness of God, always mindful of who is the source and ending, however.



God, of course, also very distinctly provides for the needs of our souls. He sent His Son to be our Savior. In his very body, our Lord Jesus Christ lived the life that God demands of us all - a life we have failed to live because of our sins - and, in his body Jesus reconciled and atoned for our sins by his love. passion and obedience on the cross, once and for all. God delivers this forgiveness to us consistently through the means of His Word and Sacraments. We hear the Word proclaimed and receive divine forgiveness through a human voice. In our Baptism we are called into God's family and God ignites the gift of faith in us though the Holy Spirit. At the altar we receive the life-giving body and blood of our Savior to nourish us in this same faith until the end. Our God is a God who works through means.

How does that connect to our Steward Musings for the month, you ask? Hear (read!) what St. Paul wrote in his letter to the Philippians in chapter four: "I have received full payment, and more. I am well supplied, having received from Epaphroditus the gifts you sent, a fragrant offering, a sacrifice acceptable and pleasing to God. And my God will supply every need of yours according to his riches in glory in Christ Jesus".

God provided for St. Paul through the Philippians. Their generosity became God's means. And: God who loves both, Paul and the Philippians, provided ultimate supply of all required, through Christ Jesus. You see, our God is a God who works through means.



In many ways what of the long explanation Martin Luther gave in

the Catechism to the question: What does it mean that God gives us our daily bread? God uses 'stuff' from the stuff we encounter in Baptism and Communion (water, bread and wine) to the 'stuff' that God sets before us in myriad ways every moment of our lives -- often through the love and care of others.

I trust this is not more but also not less than a very simple reminder of how being a manager of God's blessings is an extension of what God does and provides in the first place. God always has and always will. That is good to know as we walk into an uncertain future.



### Did you know...

...that the NALC has a 10-Point Vision for the future? These ten emphases were accepted by the Convocation in August as attempts to build on what has been done during the first ten years of the church body's existence. The ten points are as follows:

1. A church body committed to developing disciplemaking congregations and cultures.

2. A body of believers committed to increasing our mission outreach and congregational multiplication efforts.

3. A denomination in which every congregation receives regular and consistent pastoral support.
4. A continuing education emphasis that supports the ongoing development of all NALC pastors and lay leaders.

5. A strategy for continental restructuring that is able to expand our denominational growth.6. A denomination with the strongest and most highly respected Lutheran Seminary training system in North America.

7. A communications strategy focused on forming identity, unity and testimony across our church body.

8. A denomination in which our international and ecumenical relationships strengthen our shared commitment to the Great Commission, the Great Commandments and the Church catholic, and which enhance our partnership on the congregational level.

9. A church body with the financial strength to support its God-given vision.

10. A Strategic Planning Team (SPT) that continually prays for and works to develop the next



steps for our God-given vision and future.

...that the U.S. State Department this month declared Pakistan "a country of particular concern" for violations of religious freedoms — a designation the Pakistani government rejects? The declaration was based in part on an appraisal by the U.S. Commission on International Religious Freedom that underage girls in the minority Hindu, Christian, and Sikh communities were "kidnapped for forced conversion to Islam... forcibly married and subjected to rape." While most of the converted girls are impoverished Hindus from southern Sindh province, two new cases involving Christians, have roiled the country

in recent months. The girls generally are kidnapped by complicit acquaintances and relatives or men looking for brides. Sometimes they are taken by powerful landlords as payment for outstanding debts by their farmhand




parents, and police often look the other way. Once converted, the girls are quickly married off, often to older men or to their abductors, according to the independent Human Rights Commission of Pakistan. Forced conversions thrive unchecked on a money-making web that involves Islamic clerics who solemnize the marriages, magistrates who legalize the unions and corrupt local police who aid the culprits by refusing to investigate or sabotaging investigations, say child protection activists.

...that the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints was hit with several lawsuits in late December for allegedly covering up decades of



sexual abuse among Boy Scout troops in Arizona, marking the latest litigation before the state's endof-year deadline for adult victims to sue?

...that Pope Francis continued his cleanup of Vatican finances by stripping the powerful department of the Secretariat of State of its financial assets, the Vatican announced on December 28<sup>th</sup>? The funds had come under scrutiny in 2019 after a questionable investment in luxury apartments in London. The new papal decree will shift the funds held by the Secretariat of State to the Administration of the Patrimony of the Holy See, or APSA, which already handles the Vatican's investment portfolio and real estate holdings. APSA will also oversee the Pope's personal account and *Peter's Pence*, a global fund to sustain the Pope's charitable actions.



...that among the legislative loose ends that made their way into the \$900 billion spending bill passed by Congress on December 21<sup>st</sup> was a significant update to the 18-year-old Tibetan

Policy Act, strengthening U.S. support for Tibetan autonomy and religious freedom for followers of Tibetan Buddhism around the globe? The new legislation, called the Tibetan Policy and Support Act, appears deep in the bill and has drawn attention for weighing in on the current Dalai Lama's reincarnation, one of the few instances the Buddhist concept has been mentioned in U.S. law. The unaccustomed religious language, however, is not an example of American legislators "pontificating on the Tibetan religion," said the Vice President of the International Campaign for Tibet, which helped congressional leaders frame the legislation. Rather, the clauses on reincarnation are aimed at preserving Tibet's cultural and political distinctiveness. By adding new provisions to the 2002 Tibet act, the new bill "institutionalizes" two decades of developments in U.S. policy on Tibet, the spokesperson said.

Receive greetings my dear friend hoping you are doing well. I together with my family are doing well and we thank God.


