FROM THE PASTOR

Those whom God has joined together - God will separate

Martin Luther lovingly called his wife "Kitty, my rib" and declared marriage "a school for character." -"There is a lot to get used to in the first year of marriage," Luther wrote. "One wakes up in the morning and finds a pair of pigtails on the pillow which were not there before."

Ruby and Jeff are the names of the first couple at whose marriage ceremony I presided in the spring of 1992. Since that day I have officiated at well over 200 weddings. That is most likely a much higher number of wedding ceremonies than most pastors can record. I do not know if Ruby and Jeff 'made it' or if their marriage became a divorce statistic. I do know though that a few of these 200 plus marriages ended in despair and anger. In some cases I am unfortunately not surprised, in others I am dumbfounded and for all marriage dissolutions I am deeply saddened. Surely, nobody rejoices over a broken marriage, even if it is the 'best of two evils' for all involved. Yet, I also know that many, if not most, of the marriages I pronounced are still strong, blessed with unfailing commitment even in the midst of grave life-altering events and circumstances. That certainly makes my heart sing! It is beautiful, exciting, and deeply gratifying to see how a young love matures and grows and becomes a blessing to the surrounding world. Yet, I know one thing for sure: all of these marriages, good, bad and in between, as well as my own marriage, will eventually end. 100 percent of all marriages will come to an end and none of us will be able to beat those odds.

Many couples who are ready to make a lifelong commitment to each other fear that something, anything, will interfere not only with their happiness and love, but cause them to lose their partner. It is a fear we all can confirm: you will lose each other. Not necessarily by choice but by death. Even if the blessing of the Lord rests upon a relationship for 50, 60, 75 or more years – eventually one of the partners will have to lay the other into the arms of God...and that day can be a day of endless sadness and sorrow.

Some people assume that a funeral for old partners is not as difficult as when a younger person is called into the Church Triumphant. Yes, there indeed is a huge difference between greatgrandparents bidding each other farewell and a young couple whose hopes and dreams are cut short by untimely death. Still, the better and/or longer a marriage, the harder the end can be, indeed. Having had 'a good run' does not make sorrow easier – how does one survive without the person who has been with you for a lifetime of joys and sorrows, pain and delight?

I once read the advice of a seasoned pastor who seriously admonishes couples at the time of a wedding to give one another back to God already; back to the Creator who made them and sustained them; getting the grieving over with before it can become unbearable. "Let God hold the other. That way, each new day when you find your partner next to you, you can rejoice in the temporary gift you still have with you." Yeah, I am not so sure that we all linger too much and too long on the "until death parts us" phrase during the speaking of the vows. We know it, but then... Living in the real world, we all recognize that it can be hard to think of our spouses as gifts from God who are on temporary loan from Him. Yes, there are even days when we have a tough time thinking of our children as such. But, you see, this ought to be our encouragement - toward our own marriage and toward the marriages that touch our lives in our circle of relatives and friends.



Sometimes, truth be told, unmarried people can be very helpful in keeping a clear eye on what marriage is to be because they are not burdened by the nitty-gritty, big and small adjustments, compromises and sacrifices married people have to make on a daily basis. <u>The concerns of single</u> <u>persons are equally important yet different.</u> We all watch marriages, we all are influenced by marriages, most of us are here because of marriages – there is not a person who does not know something about married life, theoretically or practically or both.

After 45 years of marriage I know so much 'practical stuff' that I need to be mindful not to forget the 'theoretical' – as in: what is the purpose of marriage, what was God's intent, what must and can



the church say about the union of two people God brings together?

Of course, we all know that not every marriage will be lived in gladness and delight - and still: I pronounce the words "Those whom God has joined together, let no one put asunder," with particular sincerity and emphasis, making sure my voice can be heard loud and clear and strong (yep, I do, even if you don't remember it that way!!)...for God's intent for our commitment to be life-long is loud and clear and strong..." The Lord God in His goodness created us male and female, and by the gift of marriage founded human community in a joy that begins now and is brought to perfection in the life to *come..."* The community of God's people still needs to be able to say that - while we acknowledge the reality of brokenness and stand ready to pick up and support those whose commitments falter. "Because of sin, our age-old rebellion, the gladness of marriage can be overcast and the gift of the family can become a burden."

It has been a great joy for me to officiate at weddings. Unlike many of my colleagues, I do not dread weddings (only once did I have to shake my finger at a mother of the bride). We are witnesses to something grand when we come to watch the beginning of a marriage: two people making a commitment and God granting His blessing; a man leaving his father and mother and joining his wife. In the midst of the joy it is a good idea to keep in mind that this will be a temporary endeavor – a gift for now but not forever. When we join that union, we automatically agree to give our spouse back to the One from whom they came: God. Whether death comes early or late, expected or like a thief in the night: in the end, it is all part of the mystery of life only God can explain and solve. When we say "I do" we agree to treasure the fleeting gift not only for better or worse, but also for longer or shorter.

May all marriages bless the God who ordained them and may we support all who have made that commitment to each other...until we all finally sit at the marriage feast of the Lamb of God that has no end. Love in Christ – PZ+




for the next few Sundays, or forms located in the narthex or office. The cost is \$13 per plant. You are also welcome to bring in your own.

DID YOU KNOW

...that while 27 percent of Americans identify as spiritual but not religious, a quarter of those surveyed in April of 2020 said the pandemic has increased their religious faith? Some report a greater awareness of God.

...that only one member of the current Congress self-identifies as 'religiously unaffiliated'?

...that the percentage of Americans who rate their own mental health as excellent took a hit during Covid? It is now worse than in the last two decades.

...that a British archeologist thinks he has



discovered the childhood home of Jesus? Carved out of stone the home lies beneath a fifthcentury convent in Nazareth. Such claims about the

place had been made before but then had been rejected. After 14 years of research, the archeologist believes that the home speaks to the expertise of Joseph, a carpenter.

...that more than 1,600 people signed a petition protesting the Washington National Cathedral's decision to host evangelical megachurch pastor Max Lucado as a guest preacher in early February, saying the move contradicted the Episcopal Church's stance supporting LGBTQ inclusion? The petition reasoned that Lucado had written unfavorably about homosexuality and gay marriage. Cathedral Dean Randy Hollerith defended the decision to let Lucado speak, saying the church's commitment to its LGBTQ members remained "unshakable and unchanged." but "when we only engage with those with whom we agree on every issue, we find ourselves in a dangerous (and lonely) place." "My hope is that all churches and faith communities will find ways to open their doors to perspectives different from their own," he said. Cathedral spokesman Kevin Eckstrom

emphasized that Lucado, a popular author and teaching minister at Oak Hills Church in San Antonio, Texas, was not asked to preach on LGBTQ issues. The Right Rev. V. Gene Robinson, retired Episcopal bishop of New Hampshire and the first



openly gay bishop in the Anglican communion, presided over the service where Lucado preached.

...that during President Biden's Inauguration Gospel singer Yolanda Adams performed Leonard Cohen's "Hallelujah" as part of a memorial to those



who perished due to Covid-19? This prompted many in the Jewish community to wonder if event planners had ever really listened to the overtly sexual lyrics of the song which is inspired by King David's adulterous escapade with Bathsheba. Adams used

slightly adjusted lyrics to make the song more appropriate for the occasion. An unauthorized version of the musical piece had been used at the Republican National Convention.

I don't know about you, but one of our goals as parents was to raise children who would be generous. I am not even sure that we were



particularly good examples in the matter, but I think we can say that (factually) our sons are very generous with their time, talents and possessions – even if in spite of their more miserly parents! Surely, raising generous children is even more difficult today than it was some 40 plus years ago. We live in a society in which 'wants' are much higher on the totem pole of life than 'needs'. But: to their credit, when I speak with young students about the difference between those two, wants and needs, they clearly do know what is at stake! Of course, children learn by example and mimic what they see as much if not much more than what they hear. My father-in-law's favorite cheeky saying was: do as I say not as I do. Well, good luck!



Because we know better than that, we also know that we need to demonstrate faithful Stewardship to children. If children never see mom and dad make donations toward charitable causes, how would they be encouraged to do so themselves? Likewise, if parents bemoan openly the fact that they need to put money in the offering plate or decide to tell kids that a quarter is as good as a dollar when it comes to generosity – well, the result will speak for itself. I myself remember days when I clearly impressed upon my sons that writing that weekly check to our congregation was a hardship – and I did not mean it as sacrificial giving from the bottom of my heart!

Of course, we all tell younger generations that money does not buy happiness – and it indeed does not. We all know wealthy people who are miserable. Contentment however, is aided by remembering from whom all blessings flow and that we have what it takes to make a difference in the life and world of others. We can put our children on the path where what they do matters!

Years ago parents were told to teach children that all funds they receive should be divided into three sections – spending, saving, and sharing. 
