

A Word from our Interim Pastor David E Schafer ...



The season of Lent continues into April. During Lent, our vesper's theme has been "In View of God's Mercy". On Wednesday, April 6th, we will focus on "God's Mercy in

Service". Our Scripture lesson will center on Hebrews 6:10. As we respond to God's kindness to us through Jesus, we serve in mercy the needs of those around us by Christ's example. Be sure to join us at 7:00 P.M.

Holy Week, April 10 – April 16



Holy Week is always the climax of the Lenten season. Holy Week always begins with *Palm Sunday*. On this day, we remember when our Lord entered Jerusalem as he rode on a donkey. We are told that as the crowds greeted Jesus, they shouted "*Hosanna! Blessed be the Son of David! Hosanna in the highest!*" As the crowds welcomed Jesus, the Scriptures record that they laid palm branches on the streets as Jesus passed by. Emmanuel will reenact our Lord's triumphant entry with a special processional around the sanctuary. The service will include dramatic biblical readings and festive hymns.

Following Palm Sunday, Holy Week continues by marking each day of the week with special meaning and remembrances. On Holy Monday, our thoughts are to center on Jesus' cleansing of the Temple and his words "My Father's house shall be a house of prayer." Holy Tuesday recalls the words of Jesus in John 13:21 as he predicts his own death. Holy Wednesday recalls when Judas plotted to betray Jesus for 30 pieces of silver. Maundy Thursday recounts the night when Jesus gathered his disciples together for the Passover meal. Instead of following the Jewish traditions, Jesus instituted the sacrament of Holy Communion by offering his own Body and Blood for the forgiveness of our sins. Our worship service will include the celebration of the Lord's Supper and the stripping of the altar. Good Friday is the most solemn day in the Christian calendar. On this day, we remember the crucifixion of our Lord Jesus Christ and his death as the atonement for our sins. Holy Saturday recalls the day that Jesus ascended into hell where he proclaimed the good news to those who had gone down to the pit.

Easter Sunday and the Easter Season

The celebration of Easter Sunday is the most joyful Sunday in the year. With wonderful joy, we



hear again that Jesus has risen from the grave! We break out the hallelujahs with full voices and glad hearts. Although Jesus had died and was placed in a sealed tomb, the grave could not contain the dead body of Jesus. Three days after he died, God raised Jesus up from death to new life. The Easter Life is God's

own pledge to us that, although we will die, death does

not have the last word.

The last word belongs to

Jesus who was made alive

by the power of the resur-

rection to life everlasting.

The following is taken from <u>Our Daily Bread</u>, the very last page of the Dec-Feb 2021-2022 edition:

A Willing Sacrifice

In December 1944, in the last months of World War II, German soldiers advanced on the town of Sommocolonia, Italy. When his unit retreated, Lieutenant John Fox, an American soldier, volunteered to stay behind to call in defensive artillery to try to slow the enemy down. He and a few Italian partisans positioned themselves on the second floor of a house, and as the enemy began to swarm closer, Fox radioed requests for artillery. Each call brought the firing closer. But the radio operator questioned his final request saying, "This one will come down right on top of you." Fox insisted, saying: "Fire it." The young lieutenant sacrificed his life to fulfill his mission.


In times of war, we marvel at the brave and heroic sacrifices that are made. But the Bible tells us of an even greater sacrifice that was made for all of humanity. Because God loved us so much, He gave us an extraordinary gift- He sent His Son Jesus to die for us so that we could have eternal life (John 3:16).

But why would God do that?

Sin. Because our sin separates us from God, only the willing sacrifice of the Son of God could reconcile us (make things right) with Him. Only Jesus was completely sinless. Only Jesus could take our sins on Himself and pay the required penalty of death.

The good news is that Jesus didn't remain dead. Three days after His death, He came back to life, fulfilling His mission. In doing so, Jesus conquered our final enemy—death (1 Corinthians 15:26).

Won't you, by faith, choose to believe and accept the gift of eternal life from God?

Did You Know

...the following is the stance of the NALC to the situation in Ukraine?:



Dear Pastors, Congregations, Partners in Ministry, Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

Over the past several days, Russia has invaded Ukraine and is working to remove its government from power to replace it with its own. The actions of the Russian leader, Vladimir Putin, are unprovoked, the conflict is bloody, and the hostile takeover is one being protested by many nations throughout Europe and the entire world.

As a church body, the North American Lutheran Church (NALC) is in strong opposition to this war and is urging its pastors and congregations to be praying for an end to this senseless conflict. The NALC also has strong ties to the Ukrainian people through one of our partner ministries, the Spiritual Orphans Network (SON Network). Formerly EEMN, the SON Network, led by Executive Director Pastor David Breidenbach, serves people in parts of the world that are often overlooked as a mission field. They excel at reaching spiritual orphans in the unique context of former communist nations. In this case, they are actively involved in supporting missionaries in Ukraine, as well as providing humanitarian support to the hundreds of thousands of refugees fleeing that country in the war. As you consider how to support the people of Ukraine, know that the SON Network is an official partner ministry of the North American Lutheran Church and that their work amidst this devastating conflict is being done openly in the name of Jesus Christ.

We encourage you to be praying for the people in Ukraine, for the families torn apart by the war, for the humanitarian efforts that will be needed for some time, as well as for the hearts of the leaders of Russia and Ukraine to find ways to bring this conflict to an end, to move forward in ways that would lead to peace, and that people would be drawn to the One in whom all lasting peace is found, the Lord Jesus Christ.

The following prayer is offered for your use, individually, as families and in your congregations:

Gracious God, we come to You as people who know we have fallen short of Your call, who are in daily need of Your forgiveness and grace, and who have no lasting hope apart from the promises we have in Jesus. And yet we come with thankful and expectant hearts, knowing that You have promised to hear and to answer prayer.

We pray for You to be working in the hearts and the lives of the people in Russia and the Ukraine who are caught in this senseless war and whose lives are being torn apart because of the conflict. We pray for the families who have been separated from their loved ones, for those who have been physically hurt as a result of the fighting, and for those lives that have been lost. We pray, Lord, that You would open doors for peace talks and negotiations to happen that would bring an end to the war and that would save the lives of many for whom our Lord Jesus died.

Work through the nations of our world, through their governments, the United Nations, and through those leaders who have authority and opportunity to influence and impact what is happening in Christhonoring ways. Be with our missionaries and mission agencies — that their work would be a witness to the love You have for all people, and to the desire You have for Your world that we would live in peace.

Help us to never lose sight of the promises we have in Jesus and to never lose hope in the One who, through His cross and resurrection from the dead, has overcome the world. In His most holy and precious name we pray. Amen.





STEWARDSHIP MUSINGS

Taken from Our Daily Bread, March 14th

What does the Lord require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with you God. Micah 6:8

Justice and Jesus

Caesar Augustus (63BC-AD14), the first emperor of Rome, wanted to be known as a law-and-order ruler. Even though he built his empire on the back of slave labor, military conquest, and financial bribery, he restored a measure of legal due process and gave his citizens lustitia, a goddess our justice system today refers to as Lady Justice. He also called for a census that brought Mary and Joseph to Bethlehem for the birth of a long-awaited ruler whose greatness would reach to the ends of the earth (Micah 5:2-4).

What neither Augustus nor the rest of the world could have anticipated is how a far greater King would live and die to show what real justice looks like. Centuries earlier, in the prophet Micah's day, the people of God had once again lapsed into a culture of lies, violence, and "ill-gotten treasures"(6:10-12), God's dearly loved nation had lost sight of Him. He longed for them to show their world what it meant to do right by each other and walk humbly with Him (v.8).

It took a Servant King to personify the kind of justice that hurting, forgotten, and helpless people long for. It took the fulfillment of Micah's prophecy in Jesus to see right relationships established between God and people, and person-to-person. This would come not in the outward enforcement of Caesar-like law-and-order, but in the freedom of the mercy, goodness, and spirit of our servant King Jesus.


