A Word from Interim Pastor David E Schafer ...

Pentecost Sunday/Season of Pentecost

As we move from May into the months of June, July, August, September, October, and November, we move into the season of Pentecost. As you can tell, the Pentecost season is the longest season of the church year. During this time, the Scripture readings focus on the mission and the ministry of the Christian church.

Pentecost Sunday always follows the season of Easter. During the seven weeks of Easter, we explored how the resurrection of Jesus Christ gave the early disciples the hope and the encouragement that the resurrection offers.

The word "Pentecost" means, in part, fifty.

Pentecost Sunday comes fifty days after Easter. On the Day of Pentecost, we remember when the Holy Spirit (the spirit of the resurrection) descended on the disciples. The Book of Acts, chapter 2, tells us that on Pentecost Sunday, the Holy Spirit came to

the disciples like the rush of a mighty wind. On the Day of Pentecost, the Holy Spirit came with divided tongues of fire. And lastly, the Book of Acts records that the disciples who were gathered from many nations, were able to understand each other in their own native language.



This year, we will celebrate Pentecost Sunday on June 5, 2022 with the proclamation of God's Word and the reception of Holy

Communion. You are encouraged to wear something red on this festival Sunday.

Trinity Sunday

Trinity Sunday always follows Pentecost Sunday.

This tradition dates back to the early 14th century.

Trinity Sunday recognizes that God is one, and yet,


God the Son, Jesus Christ, and God the Holy Spirit.

How is it possible that God can be 3 in 1? The explanation is that the existence of the Trinity is a mystery that we will

Also, by tradition, the Athanasian Creed is read by the pastor and the congregation. This confession of faith dates back to the late fifth or early sixth century. This Creed is also the longest and most detailed statement of the Christian faith.


While both of our choirs enjoy their summer break, you are encouraged to share God's gift of music during the summer. If you would like to sing or offer an



Statements of Faith

The following were written by our confirmands and read by them on Confirmation Sunday:

Hebrews 4:15

For we do not have a high priest who is unable to empathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who has been tempted in every way, just as we areyet he did not sin.

I selected this verse because it connects with every single one of us. It tells us that Jesus was once just like us. He was tempted but resisted temptation. 
me in my hard times but also in my faith.

After Easter Thoughts

Taken from Our Daily Bread, April 16th

All those who knew him...stood at a distance, watching these things. [Luke 23:49]

NOT SO

"I wanted somehow to make it not so," lamented the man, eulogizing a friend who died young. His words gave poignancy to humanity's ageless heart-cry. Death stuns and scars us all. We ache to undo what can't be undone.

The longing to "Make it not so" might well describe how Jesus' followers felt after His death. The Gospels say little about those awful hours, but they do record the actions of a few faithful friends.

Joseph, a religious leader who secretly believed in Jesus (see John 19:38), suddenly found the courage to ask Pilate for Jesus' body (Luke 23:52). Ponder for a moment what it would take to remove a body from a grisly crucifixion and tenderly prepare it for burial (v.53). Consider too the devotion and bravery of the women who stayed with Jesus every step of the way, even to the tomb (v. 55).

These followers weren't anticipating a resurrection; they were coming to terms with grief. The chapter ends without hope, merely a somber, "Then they went home and prepared spices and perfumes [to embalm Jesus' body]. But they rested on the Sabbath in obedience to the commandment" (v. 56).

Little did they know the Sabbath intermission was setting the stage for history's most dramatic scene. Jesus was about to do the unimaginable. He would make death itself "not so."

Where do you turn for comfort when the worst happens? How do you live as though the resurrection is real?

Today, Father, I pause to remember how it must have been that day between Your Son's crucifixion and His resurrection. I'm so grateful that He's reversed sin's curse for me.

The following was sent out as an e-mail after Pastor David Steffenson's death, by his wife at his request, and is shared with you as a testimony to his life...

A final message from Pastor Dave Steffenson: 4:31 - Prayer Time (April 29, 2022)

First Word: II Timothy 4:1-8 - "I charge you in the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and by his appearing and his kingdom: preach the word; be ready in season and out of season; reprove, rebuke, and exhort, with complete patience and teaching. For the time is coming when people will not endure sound teaching, but having itching ears they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own passions, and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander off into myths. As for you, always be sober-minded, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, fulfill your ministry. As for me, I am already being poured out as a drink offering, and the time of my departure has come. I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, & I have kept the faith. Henceforth there is laid up for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will award to me on that day, and not only to me but also to all who have loved his appearing."

Today: This will be my final 4:31. As the LORD allows, you will be in my heavenly prayers. The time of my departure has arrived. I lived for this day. The LORD has called me home. The LORD is my eternal home (Psalm 90). Julie is sending this out to you. Jesus promised to prepare a place for me. The place is ready. Bios (the temporal) has been swallowed up by the eternal (*Zoe*). St. Paul passed the baton on to his beloved Timothy. I pass the baton on to you. The world has lots of people with itching ears. Some people only want preachers who tell them only what they want to hear. I have tried to listen to God's Word and to proclaim it faithfully and confidently. I trust the promises of God and I know that you do too. Jesus would not have said, "I'm preparing an abiding place for you," if it were not so. Jesus would not have said, "I know my own and my own know me and no one can snatch one of my lambs out of my hands," unless it were true. He who began a good work in us will surely bring it to completion at the Day of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Nothing can separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus! I am sealed by the Holy Spirit and marked with the cross of Christ forever. "O love that will not let me go!" Death has been swallowed up in victory. "Come, you who are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world." The promising Word of God—the forever love of Jesus—holds us tight! "As for you, always be sober-minded, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, fulfill your ministry." As for me...the time of my departure has come. Departure means arrival. Throughout my journey with cancer, God gave me the grace to cling to Christ like a burr on a velvet dress. I have shed plenty of tears (liquid prayers), but I never lost my confidence in Christ and His promising love for me. Julie and I didn't focus on what was being taken away, but instead we celebrated what has been given. God is so good. "Grateful" became our word for each day. When I think of Paul's words to Timothy, I am mindful that the fight is really a fought. The victory was won when Jesus died on the cross for the forgiveness of our sins. The race is finished only when Jesus carries us across the finish line. And the saving faith we have is the work of God, not the effort or decision making of a fallen sinner. It's all grace; abundant and overflowing; 100%. The Righteous Judge has a crown of righteousness which He chooses to mercifully place on our heads. "My hope is built on nothing less, Than Jesus' blood and righteousness; No merit of my own I claim, But wholly lean on Jesus' name. On Christ, the solid rock, I stand: All other ground is sinking sand." No storm can shake my inmost calm, while to that ROCK I'm clinging. Since Christ is Lord of heaven and earth. How can I keep from singing! I'm spending eternity with Jesus. "The Lord was there to hear my Borning Cry. He rejoiced the day I was baptized. When the evening



Meeting called to order by: Mark Fredrickson - President

Attended: Mark Borchardt- V President, Patti Rustad - Stewardship, Belinda Borchardt-Evangelism, Abbie Steinberg-Christian Education, Will Bartz-Youth, Emi Kuntz-Lay Ministry, and Jason Hackbart- Property.

Absent: Sharon Hulshizer, Secretary/Treasurer.

Agenda review: $\underline{M/S/C}$ to accept agenda as amended: under 9-New Business: a)On-line services, b) New WCDA Grant idea, c) Daycare.

Review Printed Minutes: $\underline{M/S/C}$ to accept minutes as presented.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer's report accepted.

Administrative Report: written report submitted: Pastor Schafer has been doing home visits weekly, attendance is holding steady. There are 2 Confirmands this year, Confirmation will be May 1st; Pastor Weeg has been invited to participate. A Confirmand/Graduate recognition reception will be hosted by the ENALCW on April 24th. The two students presented for the Rite of Affirmation of Baptism this year are Jaxon Edwards and Aundraya M/S/C to approve the Confirmands presented. The Easter Cantata will be held at Emmanuel on April 30th. Jeff has sprayed for squirrels in the back shed and seems to have taken care of the problem. There was some rain in the parsonage basement after the last heavy rain. Harley Rongved has been cleaning at the parsonage and will be attending the Iowa Youth NALC Mission trip in July, she has made her down payment and may need help with the remainder of expenses. JC Dawald has looked over the life insurance policy that was purchased and given to Emmanuel. He recommends paying some into the premium on an annual basis over several years, possible using an undesignated CD to

do so. Council suggests that CD options be looked into for next month's meeting.

Board Highlights:

Stewardship- no report.

Lay Ministry- no report.

Evangelism- the Highway 9 Church sign has been picked out. It will be sky blue with black lettering. A Lutheran Rose will be done by D & D. The sign will be pulled up and decisions on how to paint the background will be made.

Y& E: Easter breakfast was attended by 80 people, there were 2 shifts of workers. Vacation Bible School will be held late summer on a Tues, Wed, Thursday schedule.

Property- 1) Moisture in parsonage, few puddles, north sump pump failed, adjusted float, got it running and will monitor. A second hand railing will be installed on the north set of basement steps, to be used only for emergency purposes. 2) Flooring: will go ahead with the gravity tile, free floating flooring. The color has been chosen by the board. It will cost \$1900 to upgrade. M/S/C to proceed with the board's recommendation and funds for payment to be determined. 3) Additional funds will be needed for lawn mowing at the parsonage that will exceed the current budget. Additional amount needed is \$1260 (28 weeks at \$45/week). Council authorized the increased amount. 4) Discussion of chairs needing replacement in the library. Most chairs are not repairable. May need to order new ones.

Membership review: none

Unfinished business:

- a) Call Committee: has received one application yesterday, will be interviewing.
- b) PA system: no report, still looking into replacement of carillon.
- c) Nativity set: has been chosen. M/S/C to order the six piece set recommended by the committee.
- d) Ed Unit flooring: already discussed.
- e) Small and Rural Church Ministry Course (NALC): first one was not watched, some

issues with getting connected. Video is available for viewing, let Sharon know if interested. The second zoom meeting is on April 21st.

New Business:

- a) On-line services: discussion with Will/Marena on continuing to tape church services once a month. Will can check online to see how many views there are and how long they are. Possibility of taping devotionals instead.
- b) New WCDA Grant idea: suggestion to apply for a grant to replace the landscaping.
- c) Daycare: discussion on using the church to provide daycare. Can use Merriland preschool as a resource. M/S/C for 5 people to form a task force to explore the possibility of daycare at Emmanuel Lutheran Church.

Stewardship Musings

Taken from the June 1st devotion in Our Daily Bread

Your Father, who sees what is done in secret, will reward you. Matthew 6:4

Every day, Glen purchases his morning coffee at a nearby drive-through. And every day he also pays for the order of the person in the car behind him, asking the cashier to wish that person a good day. Glen has no connection to them. He's not aware of their reactions; he simply believes this small gesture is "the least he can do." On one occasion, however, he learned of the impact of his actions when he read an anonymous letter to the editor of his local newspaper. He discovered that the kindness of his gift on July 18, 2017, caused the person in the car behind him to reconsider their plans to take their own life later that day.

Glen gives daily to the people in the car behind him without receiving credit for it. Only on this single occasion did he get a glimpse of the impact of his small gift. When Jesus says we should "not let [our] left hand know what [our] right hand is doing" (Matthew 6:3), He's urging us to give--as Glen does-without need for recognition.

When we give out of love for God, without concern for receiving the praise of others, we can trust that our gifts—large or small—will be used by Him to help meet the needs of those receiving them.

A history of the structures from 1883 to today by Bill Borchardt

WHERE TO BEGIN?

A few years back, a lifetime ago
Think that was when I wanted to know
Papers, books, and so much more
Stuffed in cabinets, boxes, on floor
Lots of other places, too
What a mess, what should we do?
Put it together, in ONE place
Helped to make more office space.

Time went by, busy elsewhere Other matters needed care Have to go where one is hired Long days, came home tired. Another day, not long ago Had a question, where to go? Just what is Kasota stone? Just could not leave it alone. Found it is another rock Seemed to me a roadblock BUT...

Time to go where I should. Made commitment that I would.

Eighteen seventy-eight, with lots laid out People in Grafton took a look about Sell lot number 1 for religious folk A dollar consideration was all it took Along comes eighteen eighty-three And a man of divinity.

That preacher came, he said, "Unite!" "If you don't there'll be a fight!" "Instead of four, make it two" "You go here, You go there!" "If you like neither, go elsewhere!" Grafton said, "We like this man.

We'll try to keep him, if we can" Build him a house on Lot 1

And thus, the Lord's work was begun. (1)

The local school, for a while
Was a placed not much for style.
But it served in the lurch
Until funds were raised to build a church
We'll buy lot 2 for 50 dollars
A business lot price, so who can holler?
And thus it came, in eighty-eight
With rail fence, is sure looked great (2)

A carriage step, just the style For folks who travel many a mile. Sat between the church and parsonage To accommodate those traveling by stage

As time goes by, a greater yearning Crops up to promote better learning. Take a year, or two from public school Time to learn "The Golden Rule" (3) Five days a week, maybe less Really don't know, can only guess Perhaps you know or were there. If you know or were, *Please Share!*

Some pictures show some little "huts". Am sure they were for, well just what? Really does not matter, Saw it on a picture, so decided to add 'er Time goes by, parsonage too small Add some rooms two stories tall (4) Congregation seems to grow and grow "Should we build? YES or NO?" (5)

In 1905, there comes a change Buildings they must rearrange (6)

But, in 1916, when Pastor John Landdeck's health began to fail, his son Pastor Carl Landdeck was called to assist. (7)

And then, again, in thirty-five
The urge to build came alive
With 40 for brick, 54 for stone
We see today which side won. (9)
Prism glass windows, concrete for step,
With stone-faced sides, folks must have leapt
In joy to see something so fine
Wrought iron rails added in '39
With a stone and glass sign
To welcome all,
A "Sermon in Stone" oh so tall!

Let's move on, to the thirty-eight Time again, to update New preacher needs a small space To keep his car, a little place (10) "We like this guy. We hope he stays. We are going thru some dismal days." The church just built leaks like a sieve Something really has to give Re-flash it twice, re-caulk it too Re-seal it twice! Windows . too! At last the structure does not leak! Of the added cost, let's not speak!

Skip ahead, to fifty-eight Educational needs cannot wait! "Tear down the house, it is not fit." And that old barn, GET RID OF IT!" "Keep the back lot, or sell? The future we cannot foretell." Use the old parsonage for Ed., Build anew for pastor's bed (11) Much controversy did abound, More information might be found. But it still stands across the street today, At this time, what more to say?

Then comes a gap of twenty years, The present day really nears. The steps outside are a fright, Things are just not quite right. Cover the steps, add an elevator, (12) Change the looks, but this is greater Through a gift made years before, One last expansion was in store A large extension, with more rooms For education, offices, even mops & brooms! Dedicated back in ninety-seven (13) The donor now resides in heaven.

Amen

- (1) **1883 First Parsonage** a 16'x24'x16' building, with 16'x12'x16' addition for Parochial students. Cost - \$806.50.
- (2) **1888 First Church** the 32'x60'x16' structure was built for \$2,799.57.
- (3) **1891 Parochial School** better known as the German School, a 12'x34'x10' structure was built for less than \$500.

- (4) 1893 Addition to Parsonage- 16'x24'x12' added for less than \$400l
- (5) 1900 Church basement, steps, and addition- a basement was dug to the south (roughly where the church stands today) and the 1888 church was set atop it with steps added. A 16'x40'addition and another addition for the choir and classrooms were appended east of the re-structured church: \$3,791.91 cost.
- (6) **1904 Parsonage** the first parsonage and additions were sold off and a 32'x34'x18' parsonage was constructed at approximately the same location for \$3,058 with \$691.41 spent for furnishings. The 75th Anniversary Book records that, "There was the usual bickering and trouble as has always been the case in any building project in this congregation."
- (7) **1918 Pastor's retirement home** a "Small house" was built for Pastor John Landdeck east of the Parochial School.
- (8) **1919 Pump House**
- (9) **1935 Church** the 1888 church and 1900 additions were moved off the site and replaced by the 40'x120' structure of today for roughly \$36,965, not \$60,000 as is commonly misquoted. The error stems from the 75th Anniversary Book. Roughly \$8,000 was used for furnishings inside the new structure and \$20,000 for later repairs.
- (10) **1938 Garage** currently a storage shed.
- (11) **1959 Parsonage**
- (12) **1980 Enclosed entrance** the new entrance with elevator was dedicated in 1980, the cost listed as \$327,927.16.
- (13) 1997- New Educational Unit
