A Word from Pastor David E Schafer ...

An Open Letter To
The Members of Emmanuel Lutheran Church
In Grafton, Iowa
From
Pr. David E. Schafer
July 25, 2022

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

On August 7th, I will be celebrating my 39th year of my ordination of the Office of Word and Sacraments in the Lutheran Church. Every day, I thank God for my calling and for the privilege of serving our Lord Jesus Christ and His Church. Indeed, I thank our Redeemer for the honor of serving you as well as your interim pastor.

Thirty-nine years ago, at my ordination, I made a number of promises to God and the Church. Among these promises, I vowed, with God's help, to "...give faithful witness in the world, that God's love may be known in all that I do".

This means, in part, I need to be honest and responsible for my words and actions. As you may know, a few weeks ago, I was unable to fulfill my duties to you because I was under the influence of alcohol. Let me assure you that I am more than disappointed and filled with my deepest regrets for my actions. Moreover, I want to let you know that I

have taken a number of steps to ensure that I will not repeat my poor decisions.

These steps include:

- I have completely stopped my consumption of alcohol.
- I have been attending meetings of the group like Alcohol Anonymous known as "Celebration Recovery". This organization uses a 12-step program based on the Bible. The first step of this organization reads, "We admitted we were powerless over our addiction and compulsive behaviors, that our lives had become unmanageable." The Scripture for this step comes from Romans 7:18 "I know that nothing good lives in me, that is, in my sinful nature. For I have the desire to do what is good, but I cannot carry it out (without God's grace).
- Ongoing outpatient treatments for my addictive behavior. As a part of my recovery, I am exploring the reason(s) for my actions.
- I am in conversations with fellow trusted colleagues for the sake of prayer, support, and accountability.

- I am open to having conversations with you. Please call me at 563-568-6199.
- Trusting in Jesus Christ, I pray that He will use my situation to His glory and be a witness of hope to others who find themselves to be in my situation.
- I would welcome an unannounced visit from any member of the council to visit with me and to check out the parsonage and my personal belongings.
- I have set up an appointment with my doctor for a complete physical and an evaluation.
- I am willing and wanting to be open to any other suggestions that you may have regarding the situation at hand.
- I am willing and wanting to be 100% accountable to you.
- I welcome your prayers and kindest thoughts.
- Each and every day, I am trusting myself to the mercy, grace, and love of God to help me to move forward with my life and the ministry that Jesus and you have entrusted to me.

The 12th step of Celebrating Recovery states "Having had a spiritual experience (sobriety) as the result of these steps; we try to carry this message to others and practice these principles in all of our affairs." The Biblical foundation for this step comes from Galatians 6:1 "Brothers and sisters, if someone is caught in a sin, you who live by the Spirit should restore that person gently. But watch yourselves, or you also may be tempted."

Over the past three weeks, I have shared with you a sermon series entitled "Seeing Jesus As He Really Is". I believe that the best way for us to see Jesus is to look upon the cross. There are two forms of the cross in our sanctuary. One of the crosses is the crucifix that reminds us of our Lord's suffering, agony, and death for our sakes and for our salvation. The second cross is the Easter cross that rests in the middle of our altar. This cross is empty of the body to remind us of the empty tomb. The cross is empty because of Jesus' victorious resurrection over sin, death, and the devil.

Allow me to close this letter to you with a quote from a contemporary Christian song sung by "We the Kingdom" entitled "God So Loved":

"Bring all your failures; Bring all your addictions, Come lay them down at the foot of the cross. Jesus is waiting there with open arms, see His open arms."

"For God so loved the world that He gave us His one and only Son to save us. Whoever believes in Him will live forever!"

All throughout my life, I have come to the foot of the cross to receive forgiveness, mercy, and life. During this chapter of the ministry and the mission of Emmanuel, I believe that Jesus both invites and welcomes us all to the foot of His cross.

It is only at the foot of the cross that we can receive all that we need for life here and now. It is also at the foot of the cross, and there alone, we are able to receive all that we can ever hope for with regards to our eternal salvation.

I want to thank you for your times and consideration in this matter.

May God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the Holy Spirit, bless and keep us throughout all of our lives and bring us to life eternal.

The following comes from Our Daily Bread, the July 17th devotion:

Traveling Mercies

He has watched over your journey...and you have not lacked anything. Deuteronomy 2:7

You might start your journey in the southwest United States in a dusty town called Why, Arizona. Heading cross-country would take you through Uncertain, Texas. Bearing northeast, you'd make a rest stop in Dismal, Tennessee. Ultimately, you'd reach your destination—Panic, Pennsylvania. These are real places across the landscape of America, though not likely a trip you'd ever choose to take.

Sometimes this is exactly what the journey of life feels like. We easily identify with the Israelites' tough life in the wilderness (Deuteronomy 2:7)—life can be hard. But do we see the other parallels? We create our own itinerary, turning from God's way (1:42-43). Like the Israelites, we often grumble about getting our needs met (Numbers 14:2). In our daily fretting, we likewise doubt God's purposes (v.11). The story of the Israelites is repeated over and over in our own.

God assures us that if we follow His path, He'll deliver us into a far better place than Dismal. He'll provide and we'll lack nothing we really need (Deuteronomy 2:7; Philippians 4:19) Yet as much as we already know this, we often fail to do it. We need to follow God's roadmap. It's a bit more of a drive, but another six hours by car would take you from the town of Panic to the place known as Assurance, West Virginia. If we let God direct our paths (Psalm 119:35), we'll journey in joy with Him at the wheel—blessed assurance indeed!



Witness Marks

"See that?" The clock repairman pointed his flashlight beam on a small, fine mark roughly engraved inside the old grandfather clock he was working on in our home. "Another repairman could have put that there almost a century ago," he said. "It's called a 'witness mark,' and it helps me know how to set the mechanism."

Before the age of technical bulletins and repair manuals, "Witness marks" were used to help the person making a future repair align moving parts with precision. They were more than just timesaving reminders; they were often left as a simple kindness to the next person doing the work.

The Bible encourages us to leave our own "witness marks" as we work for God by serving others in our broken world. The apostle Paul wrote to the church in Rome: "Each of us should please our neighbors for their good, to build them up" (Romans 15:2). This is the example of our God, "Who gives endurance and encouragement" (v.5). It's about being a good citizen of both earth and heaven.

Our "witness marks" may seem like small things, but they can make a vital difference in someone's life. An uplifting word, a financial gift to someone in need, and a listening ear—all are kindnesses that can have a lasting impact. May God help you make a mark for Him in someone's life today!

The following is an article written by Pastor David Wendel of the NALC and was printed in the April/May Newsletter. While it may not be something for Emmanuel, it is indicative of the changing times and food for thought:

Thinking outside the box for your congregation

How are we going to fill all the pastoral vacancies in the NALC? For the last few years, vacancies, both full and parttime, were usually no more than 35 at any given time. That was less than 10 percent of the total number of congregations and less than the 40 or so seminarians we had preparing for ministry year by year. Now? The latest count was 70 congregational vacancies. Double the previous number! The reasons for this are not difficult to understand: we have had a large number of pastoral retirements. and we have new congregations affiliating with the NALC that come to us without a pastor. We have the same number of seminarians but more vacancies. How will we fill the pulpits of these congregations? Hopefully you are aware of our newly approved alternative path called "Ordination Under Special Circumstances." This is an innovative process for those who may serve our smaller, more isolated congregations in special circumstances — meaning they are not able to call (and afford) a full-time pastor. While this will not be the normal path to ordination, it will help many of our congregations. At the same time, we are supporting the NEXUS Institute at Grand View University, which is aimed at strengthening and deepening the faith of high school students, especially those who may be open to God's call to full-time pastoral ministry in the Church. While this will bear fruit in the long term. these students will not be ready for ordination for eight years, in some cases. This is a worthy strategic move, but it does not address the needs of today's congregations. A major emphasis, as well, is the raising up of potential seminarians in every congregation of the NALC. Many pastors and congregational members know of persons who may have the gifts and abilities to serve as ordained ministers but need to be encouraged and supported. There is a plan for a seminarian recruitment staff person for the NALS, but a better strategy is for every pastor and member of the NALC to understand ourselves as "seminarian recruiters." Most pastors today were once told, "You might being a pastor." That kind consider encouragement is invaluable in the hearts and lives of young persons discerning a call. Let me suggest another important strategy — which could help fill our vacancies now! We are encouraging pastors and congregations to "think outside the box." Usually, a congregation which calls a full-time pastor considers that pastor to be "their" pastor. Given the challenges we face, it would be helpful for congregations to consider: How might our congregation encourage our pastor to help neighboring vacant congregations? How might our with congregation partner other vacant congregations in our area? It would be helpful for

pastors to be asking: "How can I help neighboring vacant congregations to be served, pastorally?" We are moving toward a time when again, it may not be the norm for one pastor to serve one congregation. Two or three congregations may need to be served by one pastor — not because of financial shortfalls but because there is a shortage of pastors to fill the current need. This will require "out of the box" thinking bv pastors, but even more congregational leaders! What are some real-life examples of this "out of the box" thinking? In Washington, North Carolina, the NALC congregation had a building but no pastor, whereas the local Anglican Church in North America (ACNA) congregation had a pastor but no building. They covenanted together to form Grace Church — an Anglican-Lutheran Shared Ministry. There have been some challenges and hurdles, but with those have come great opportunities for growth, mission and ministry. They are finding some visitors come because they are interested in this kind of congregation which more fully embodies the unity for which our Lord prayed at the Lord's Supper. The NALC and ACNA are working to develop processes and procedures which will encourage and enable even more cooperation on the local level in the future. Two congregations in Illinois are also thinking "outside the box" to ensure both churches have pastoral support. St. Paul Lutheran Church in Oregon, Illinois, is an NALC congregation and St. John's Lutheran Church in Creston, Illinois, is affiliated with the **NALC** Lutheran and Congregations in Mission for Christ (LCMC). Realizing the challenges presented by call processes and vacancies today, the congregations recently committed themselves to sharing a pastor. This means they need only one pastor, not two, and should free up funding which will strengthen both congregations in their mission and ministry. Far from being a step backward for either congregation, they are stepping out boldly and courageously for service in the 21st century. To fill our vacancies, it will require a total effort in each of these areas — all of us working together in creative, expansive ways to make pastoral ministry available to every congregation currently affiliated with the NALC and those yet to come.
