The Lighting of the Advent Wreath Candles

P: The Gospel of John speaks of Christ as the true light coming into the world. We light candles for the four weeks of Advent and reflect on the coming of Christ- as a child in a manger, God incarnate, and as the Lord of the living and the dead who promises to return in glory. Christ is coming. Christ is always coming, always entering a troubled world, a wounded heart. And so we light the first candle, the candle of **hope**, and dare to express our longing for peace, for healing, and the well-being of all creation.

(The candle is lit- we join in singing verse one of LBW # 34)

P: The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light;

Men: Those who lived in a land of deep darkness on them light has shined.

P: We join with our sisters and brothers in Christ, lighting candles to mark our steps in this Advent Journey.

<u>Women:</u> Even though the world seems dark and cold, we know that the light of Christ is coming. The face of our Lord will shine, and we shall be saved.

Men: Testifying against all suffering and darkness, we kindle this light. Together, we proclaim to the world that, in Christ, we have hope.

C: Loving God, as we enter this Advent season, we open all the dark places in our lives and memories to the healing light of Christ. Show us the creative power of hope. Prepare our hearts to be transformed by you that we may walk in the light of Christ.

Advent wreaths and candles are more than just pretty Christmas decorations. The arrangement of an evergreen wreath with four candles (five, if you choose to feature one for Christmas Day itself) has special meaning and is used to put our focus on the upcoming celebration of Jesus' birth.

An Advent wreath is circular and symbolizes everlasting life and unending love. The arrangement is used to put our attention on the meaning of Christmas. The candles put our focus on hope, faith, joy and peace. A new candle is lit each of the four Sundays before Christmas.

Advent is a time of expectant waiting and preparation for both the celebration of the Nativity of Christ at Christmas and the return of Christ at the Second Coming.
